
the Royal Police Academy in Amman, Jordan.

MISSION

As enshrined in the CMDR COE Concept (2016), the mission of the CMDR COE is to act as a catalyst for the enhancement of NATO, NATO Nations' and Partners' capabilities in crisis management and disaster response operations through collaborative partnerships.

To accomplish the Centre's mission we provide subject-matter expertise and advice on crisis management and disaster response, and contribute to doctrine development and to concept development and experimentation. The education and training opportunities we provide, including through mobile training teams, encompass both civilian and military experts from senior military and civilian leadership to staff level, as well as units and teams.

In close cooperation with the Joint Analysis and Lessons Learned Centre (JALLC) the CMDR COE serves as a repository for International, National and NATO shared information, analysis and lessons-learned on crisis management and disaster response.

Centres of Excellence (COEs) are nationally or multi-nationally funded institutions that train and educate leaders and specialists from NATO member and partner countries, assist in doctrine development, identify lessons learned, improve interoperability, and capabilities and test and validate concepts through experimentation. They offer recognized expertise and experience that is of benefit to the Alliance and support the transformation of NATO, while avoiding the duplication of assets, resources and capabilities already present within the NATO command structure.

Coordinated by Allied Command Transformation (ACT) in Norfolk, Virginia (USA), COEs are considered to be international military organizations. Although not part of the NATO command structure, they are part of a wider framework supporting NATO Command Arrangements. The ACT has overall responsibility for COEs and is in charge of the establishment, accreditation, preparation of candidates for approval, and periodic assessments of the centres. Designed to complement the Alliance's current resources, COEs cover a wide variety of areas, with each one focusing on a specific field of expertise to enhance NATO capabilities.



BACKGROUND

COEs trace their roots back to the reorganisation of NATO's military command structure following the Prague Summit in 2002. After the summit, Allied Command Atlantic became Allied Command Transformation (ACT). ACT became responsible for transforming the Alliance into a leaner, more efficient organisation.

Specifically, ACT ensures that the Alliance is able to face future challenges by enhancing training, conducting experiments to test new concepts and promoting interoperability within the Alliance. In line with this goal, ACT has used its links with various institutions to direct the transformation of the military structure, forces, capabilities and doctrine of the Alliance.

ROLE OF COEs

COEs generally specialise in one functional area and act as subject-matter experts in their field. They distribute their in-depth knowledge through training, conferences, seminars, concepts, doctrine, lessons learned and papers.

In addition to giving NATO and partner country leaders and units the opportunity to augment their education and training, COEs also help the Alliance to expand interoperability, increase capabilities, aid in the development of doctrine and standards, conduct analyses, evaluate lessons learned and experiment in order to test and verify concepts.

COEs work alongside the Alliance even though NATO does not directly fund them and they are not part of the NATO command structure. They are nationally or multi-nationally funded and are part of a supporting network, encouraging internal and external information exchange to the benefit of the Alliance. The overall responsibility for COE coordination and utilisation within NATO lies with Allied Command Transformation (ACT), in coordination with the Supreme Allied Commander Europe (SACEUR).

COEs MECHANISM

There are three different types of participants for COEs: "Framework Nations", "Sponsoring Nations" and "Contributing Nations". Generally, a Framework Nation agrees to take on the responsibility of developing the concept and implementation of the COE. In addition, it agrees to provide physical space for the operation of the COE, as well as personnel to run the institution. Sponsoring Nations contribute financially to the COE and also provide personnel, whose salary they cover. Contributing Nations may provide financial support or some other service that is of use to the functioning of the COE.

All COEs must act as a catalyst for NATO transformation and open activities to all Alliance members. COEs must not duplicate nor compete with current NATO capabilities, but instead offer an area of expertise not already found within NATO. To this end, all COEs must have subject-matter experts in their field of specialisation. ACT periodically re-assesses COEs in order to ensure that they continue to meet those criteria and assure continued NATO accreditation status. Ultimately, the Military Committee and the North Atlantic Council must approve the initial accreditation of the COE.



MAIN EVENTS OCTOBER-DECEMBER 2022

Activecontribution to a computer-assisted exercise

CMDR COE and the South-Eastern Europe Brigade Headquarters (SEEBRIG HQ) actively collaborate in education and training processes. Part of this collaboration is supporting the planned exercises by SEEBRIG with subject matter experts from the CMDR COE.

The Command Post Exercise (CPX), Computer-assisted exercise (CAX) "Seven Stars 22" was the largest SEEBRIG's event for 2022 and took place in Veles, North Macedonia from 3 to 7 October 2022. The focus of the exercise was on optimizing processes, procedures, capabilities, and enriching the brigade's capabilities in peacekeeping operations.

CMDR COE provided two experts for support to the exercise as a part of the White Cell. The aim of the exercise was to improve the SEEBRIG's overall operational capabilities and to enhance military interoperability between its HQ and the assigned units/subunits during the Peace Support Operations.

Prolific course for CRO decision makers



CMDR COE executed its NATO Approved Strategic Decision Making for Crisis Response Operations Course for the time 10-14 October 2022. Centre's real and on-line premises were field for in-depth consultation and decision-making process where experts from seven countries were briefed by international experts in the area of crisis response operations. Computer simulations underpinned the strategic level of discussions and thinking and provided evaluation of all the risks and level of effectiveness of the taken decisions.

Hybrid iteration of the course provided opportunity of those who were not able to come into the Center, to experience full options of presenting and discussions while staying remotely and not losing the chance to be involved in teamwork.

Assessment visit



CMDR COE welcomed a Periodic Assessment Team from HQ SACT that conducts periodically an overall assessment of the Centre's capabilities. The PA Team included LtC Michael Maus, Section Head (COE Operations), Mr Bruce Hutchison, Staff Officer COE Coordination & AIWG COE Programme Development Branch, and Mrs Rachel Grimes MBE, Strategic Plans and Policy Liaison Officer to the UN, ICRC and NGOs, Lead on Human Security. Their 2-day visit covered constructive discussions and an in-depth review of the continuous development of the CMDR COE since the last periodic assessment. The distinguished inspection received a comprehensive information on all Centre's aspects of work by the director, Colonel Nikolov and chiefs of branches of CMDR COE.

The Academic Advisory Board (AAB) meeting



The third Academic Advisory Board meeting was held in hybrid (residential and on-line) format in the CMDR COEon 2 November 2022.

The aim of the event was to review the academic and research activities implemented by the CMDR COE through the academic year 2022 and to plan the forthcoming contributions of the Board's members in 2023.

The CMDR COE's leadership availed this opportunity to express gratitude and appreciation to the Chair of the Board, Prof. Dr. Sc. MitkoStoykov as well as to the Board's members - Assoc. Prof. Nina Dobrinkova, Dr. KonstantiosBalomenos, COL Dariusz Majchrzak, Principal Quaestor Stefan Savulescu and the observer Assoc. Prof. Dr. Vasileios Syros - all of them being representatives of the CMDR COE's Framework and Sponsoring nations.

Fruitful recommendations were made during discussions with the focus on improving the common course curricula of some of the courses during the academic year 2022/2023 and developing the content of new educational solutions regarding the most current cross-cutting topics in NATO and international community.

CMDR COE Steering Committee



The 10th CMDR COE Steering Committee meeting was held on 2 and 3 November 2022.At the Centre's premises in Sofia were welcomed representatives from the Framework Nation, the Republic of Bulgaria besides those from the Sponsoring Nations, namely the Hellenic Republic, Hungary, the Republic of Poland, and Romania, as well as the observers the Republic of North Macedonia. The SC meetingplaced emphasis on the successful delivery of the tasks, assigned to the CMDR COE, and on the high quality of its products and conducted events. Furthermore, all participants stressed the importance of collaboration and partnerships, especially with regard to the work of the Centre.

The SC became familiarised with the ongoing CMDR COE's activities. The SC approved the budget and Programme of Work for 2022 as well.

The Euro-Atlantic Resilience Forum 2022



The Euro-Atlantic Resilience Forum, held 15-16 November 2022 in Bucharest, Romania, aimed to bring together the most relevant actors, key decision makers, and top experts in all aspects of resilience within the scope of NATO and EU interests.

More than 60 speakers in 12 sessions and side events, dealing with the most important areas of resilience, as set out in the strategic documents of NATO and the EU: societal and democratic resilience, resilience to emergencies and disasters, resilience to climate change, resilience to emerging and disruptive technologies, the resilience of critical infrastructures (transportation, communications), continuity of government etc.

The CMDR COE Director, Colonel Orlin Nikolov, participated as a Speaker at the Panel "Resilient Cities for the Future: Natural disasters and the Spiral of

Disinformation", together with Dr. Raed Arafat, Secretary of State, Head of the Department for Emergency Situations, Ministry of Internal Affairs, Romania.

Collaboration with the Romanian National Defence University



On the 16th November 2022 was signed a Framework Collaboration Agreement between the CMDR COE and the Carol I National Defence University. Both entities have entered into the Framework Collaboration Agreement in order to promote, facilitate, and cooperate in the fields of emergency/crisis management, resilience, and disaster response. This includes, but is not limited to education and training opportunities, research and development, and providing Subject Matter Expertise (SME) based on the principles of reciprocity and mutual benefit.

Strategic rethinking conference



The CMDR COE, Sofia Security Forum and Friedrich Naumann Foundation for Freedom with the co-sponsorship of the NATO Public Diplomacy Division organized and conducted an international conference titled 'Strategic rethinking: new NATO Strategic Concept and EU Strategic Compass. Perpectives of Central and Eastern European Member States'.

The event took place on 17 November 2022. It was conducted in hybrid mode, including by physical presence in Marinela Hotel, Sofia, Bulgaria, and online. Over 100 representatives from NATO, EU, State Institutions, Think Tanks, Academia, Diplomatic Corps, Media and young professionals had the opportunity to participate in the discussions.

The main goal of the conference was to discuss the complexity of current risks and threats to the regional and global security, predominantly those arising from the Russian aggression against sovereign Ukraine. Keeping in mind the potential global dimensions of this war, the conference also discussed possible responses to the Russian hybrid warfare against the democratic world, including weaponization of the energy supplies, propaganda, fake news, cyber-attacks and others. At the same time, it took into consideration all other threats such as terrorism, migration, natural disasters, climate change and many others.

Cooperative workshop

A workshop of the project "Confrontation of CBRN-Terrorism Threats" with an acronym: `COBRA` was held on 15 and 16 November 2022 at the CMDR COE premises. The event is based on the signed memorandum of bilateral cooperation between the Institute of Information and Communication Technologies (IICT)- Bulgarian Academy of Sciences (BAS) and the CMDR COE.

The aim of the workshop was to restart the physical events of the consortia after the COVID19 pandemic situation. The main focus of this event was to update the Training Pilots, Workshop and Final Event schedules until the project end. During the workshop were discussed topics such as: Discussion on consortium issues due to COVID19 extension period; Interaction between the operational teams; Set up the dates of the Training Pilots; Set up the dates of the next Workshops and Plan the Final Event period of the project closure.

The Hungarian MOD's Annual Disaster Response conference



Upon the invitation from the State Secretary for Defence Policy and Defence Development, the CMDR COE participated for the first time in the Annual Disaster Response Conference organized by the Defence Administration Department of the Hungarian Ministry of Defence in Budapest, on 15 November 2022. The topics for discussion covered many current national and international aspects of disaster management. During the conference, the CMDR COE's representative, Colonel Laszlo Juhasz has made the audience familiar with the core business of the Centre, and more specifically with its main activities throughout the disaster response cycle.

Hybrid course iteration for exercises planners

In the period 21-25 November 2022, a hybrid (residential and online) iteration of the Crisis Management and Disaster Response Exercise Planners Training Course was conducted with 23 participants from nine countries. They got together in the Centre's premises and its Virtual Studio. The aim was the acquisition of knowledge that would help to upgrade the needed skills for planning and conducting crisis management and disaster response exercises.

In fact, this course is unique in NATO because it builds fundamental knowledge on the NATO Exercise Planning Process at strategic and operational levels with a special focus on the Crisis Management and Disaster Response, as well as incorporating in its program the best practices from the Humanitarian Assistance domain.

CASTLE-22

The Hellenic National Defense General Staff (HNDGS) organized and conducted a multinational crisis management exercise (CMX) called "Climate Change Disaster Response CASTLE-22". The event from 28 to 30 November 2022was held in Athens, Greece and members of the Centre participated there as observers.

Participation in I/ITSEC 2022

The Crisis Management and Disaster Response Centre of Excellence was presented at the I/ITSEC in Orlando, Florida. Our research task group on "Space Weather Environmental Modelling (SWEM)" presented the results of its work on "AI in support of Crisis Decision Making with M&S" on 29 November.

The Centre's representatives introduced the "Modelling & Simulation Support for Building Resilience and Refugee Flows Management" on 30 November. The work is a part of the # NATO Modelling and Simulation Group NMSG Specialist Team, MSG-213.

The Interservice/Industry Training, Simulation and Education Conference (I/ITSEC) is the world's largest modeling, simulation and training event. It consists of peer-reviewed paper presentations, tutorials, special events, professional workshops, a commercial exhibit hall, a serious games competition, and STEM events for teachers and secondary students. I/ITSEC is organized and sponsored by the National Training & Simulation Association (NTSA), which is an affiliate subsidiary of the National Defense Industrial Association (NDIA). Thus, I/ITSEC also emphasizes themes related to defense and security.

Notable visit from Japan



On 14 November 2022, the Centrehad the privilege to welcome a delegation from Japan led by Mr. Atsushi SAITO, Director for European Policy Division, Ministry of Foreign Affairs of Japan, and Mr. Tomoki MATSUO, Director for International Policies, Ministry of Defence.

The CMDR COE presented to the delegation the concept, vision, principles, COEs network, and specifically the organization of CMDR Centre. Additionally the Centre's Branch Chiefs introduced the main activities and projects performed in their Branches. It was underlined the wide opportunities of possible contribution and collaboration. Such process is open for all NATO and PfP members, as well for NATO's Mediterranean Dialogue and the Istanbul Cooperation Initiative, and Global partners.

The distinguished guests expressed interests on the opportunities of non-NATO nations to collaborate with the Centre and the possible advantages in cooperation.

SEESIM 22 CPX/CAX



It was the tenth in a series of exercises within the framework of the South-Eastern Europe Defense Ministerial (SEDM) process. A biannual event that strives to promote cooperation, coordination and interoperability of civil-military operations and reinforce real crisis response within and among the SEDM nations through the effective use of computer modelling and simulation (M&S)

The aim of the exercise was to implement regional emergency response procedures among SEDM member nations' Emergency operation centers (EOCs). The CMDR COE provided an environment, focused on the enhancement of the interoperability and coordination in Disaster response (DR) operations in a multinational environment under realistic conditions. Our Centre supported the TA and EXCON efforts in the frame and limitations of international HQ.

MAIN EVENTS JANUARY-SEPTEMBER 2023

Focus on the Building Integrity



In the period 23-26 January 2023, the iteration of the Building Integrity Principles for Presenters (BIPP) Course (train-the-trainers course) took place in a residential mode at the Centre premises. The BI UK Team delivered all lectures and training from the Defence Academy of the United Kingdom.

The train-the-trainer programme aims to teach future civilian and military instructors in BI subjects. This programme is organised back-to-back with the Defence Leadership in BI course. The aim is to establish a pool of specialists trained in building integrity and reducing corruption risks. In addition, these specialists will provide future training within their structures to support the prevention and reduction of corruption.

Besides, experts from several military and civil institutions completed its curriculum as attended lectures in person while others did it digitally from their offices. All lectures were delivered by the BI UK Team from the Defence Academy of the United Kingdom.

Corruption and poor governance are recognized as security challenges that undermine freedom, rule of law and economic development, and erode public trust. Therefore, the course was designed to assist and teach in building capacities and enhance institutions in the spirit of co-operative security. The aspiration is that senior leaders attend the course as representatives, then return to their paternal organisations to encourage further engagement with the objectives of the Building Integrity.

Analysis and Lessons Learned Training



The event was conducted by JALLC instructors from 31 January to 2 February 2023 in the Centre's premises with the active participation of all CMDR COE staff

The aim of the training is to provide basic knowledge and skills to the staff members required for contribution to the Analysis and Lessons Learned (A&LL) Process. The main objective of the training has reached the CMDR COE audience with various analysis techniques and paved the way to develop skills in further LL activities and routines.

The training curriculum included theoretical lectures and practical group works. The training was completed successfully and all participants were

awarded with certificates for completion by the JALLC METT leader.

Mobile Education and Training Team in Jordan



In fulfilment of a project developed in the framework of the NATO Updated Defense Capacity Building Package for Jordan (agreed by the NATO Partnerships and Cooperative Security Committee in June 2021), Mobile Education and Training Team (METT) from the CMDR COE, in close coordination with the Jordanian Public Security Directorate (PSD), planned and conducted tailored training in the field of crisis management and disaster response (CM and DR).

The five-day course conducted in the Royal Police Academy in Amman, Jordan, aimed at providing education and training for a core group of Jordanian PSD staff and key personnel from multiple ministries and institutions (Jordanian Armed Forces and Ministries of Interior, Energy and Health). It also supported

the institutionalization of procedures and processes across different governmental levels. The CMDR COE team delivered advanced training and built knowledge, skills and competences, as well as clarified procedures for effective CM and DR not only in response to the regional security challenges stemming from terrorism and refugee movements, but also from the human-induced and natural disasters.

Visit and intensive dialog in Serbia

The CMDR COE Director paid a two-day working visit to Serbia where he conducted series of meetings with officials and representatives from institutions. The visit took place in Belgrade (2-3 March 2023) upon an invitation by the Serbian Ministry of Defence, aiming at identification of potential areas of military cooperation with the CMDR COE in the field of crisis management and disaster response.

Colonel Nikolov conducted a working dinner with the Acting Assistant Minister for Defence Policy, Mr. PredragPandic. The two officials discussed potential cooperation and support provided by the CMDR COE to the Serbian Ministry of Defence, including through participation of Serbian military and civilian staff in the educational and training activities offered by the CMDR COE to NATO Partners.

Colonel Nikolov paid a short visit to the NATO Military Liaison Office in Belgrade whereby he conducted a constructive discussion with the Head of the Office, Brigadier General Giampiero Romano. The focus of the talks was put on ensuring better coordination of efforts and synchronization of the support provided to Serbian Ministry of Defence.



Military Strategic Partnership Conference 2023



CMDR COE representatives attended the annual Military Strategic Partnership Conference, 13 - 17 March 2023, in Doha, Qatar. ACO Partnership Directorate (PD) conducts this event yearly to support the overall Allied Command Operations' (ACO) efforts to advance the NATO partnership processes and programmes. It sets planning of efforts; and provide at minimum an 80% solution to 2023/24 Partner Capitals' ambitions for Education, Training, Exercise and Evaluation (ETEE).

Parallel to the Conference, an exhibition for NATO Education and Training Facilities (NETFs), Centres of Excellences (COEs), Partnership Training and Education Centres (PTECs), and all NATO-accredited Education and Training Facilities (ETFs) engaged in supporting military partnership activities takes place. The activities and products offered by the Centre in the field of crisis management and disaster response were presented on this high forum.



Development of relations

On March 22, 2023, the Crisis Management and Disaster Response Centre of Excellence (CMDR COE) welcomed LtC Murat Payas, the military attaché of the Republic of Turkiye in Bulgaria. The meeting held in friendly atmosphere was in continuation of the formal talks between the Centre and Turkiye, established last year when General YasarGuler, Commander of the Turkish Armed Forces visited the CMDR COE.

The CMDR COE Director presented the concept and specifically the organization of CMDR Centre whilst the Branch Chiefs introduced main activities performed in their respective areas. Special focus in discussion was on the Centre's responsibilities, the occupied positions in the organization as well as its funding and Sponsoring nations' engagements.



NATO Lessons Learned Spring Week event

The NATO LL Spring Week 202, organized by HQ SACT and hosted by the CMDR COE, took place from 28 to 30 March 2023. The eventwas conducted face to face in Astoria Grand Hotel, Sofia, Bulgaria. It gathered all key NATO stakeholders within the Lessons Learned (LL) domain, giving the chance for over 60 representatives from HQ SACT, SHAPE, JALLC, CMDR COE, NATO Command Structure (NCS), NATO Force Structure (NFS), NATO Centres of Excellence (COEs) and Bulgarian Armed Forcess to participate.

The main goal of the NLLSW23 was to identify challenges and opportunities for improving LL collection, exploitation and sharing within NATO and with NATO-affiliated International Military Organizations (e.g. COEs, NFS HQs) and to reinvigorate the existing LL network.

During the NLLSW23 HQ SACT, SHAPE, JALLC addressed strategic LL issues and provided NCS/NFS/COEs with an update on the main BI SC LL initiatives, LL Collection Priorities for 2023 and LL Battle Rhythm for 2023 and 2024. In return, representatives from NCS, NFS and COEs provided insights on the challenges and opportunities with regard to improving LL delivery, collection and exploitation. Among the other topics discussed were: Innovations in the LL domain, key findings and takeaways from the NATO LL Conference 2022, LL Standardization, preparation for the NATO LL Fall Week and NATO LL Conference 2024. Also, the NLLSW23 participants had a valuable half-day discussion on several important LL topics.

The MLLSW23 ended with important updates about the most recent revisions of the NATO LL Policy and the BI SC Directive 075-003.

Climate Change and Security course



A 4-day course on Climate Change and Security, organized under the auspices of the European Security and Defence College and with the support of the Diplomatic Institute, was conducted from 28 to 31 March. It brought 30 military and civil experts from 12 countries into the Centre where interactive lectures on the challenges of climate change were delivered. The aim was to enhance awareness of security implications through acquisition of basic knowledge related to global warming as a phenomenon and a security threat multiplier.

The lectures were given by experts from national and international institutions that addressed the role of NATO and the EU in handling the threats caused by climate change. The participants were divided in three teams to work on two tasks that delt with significant global issues: the factors that can help us to mitigate climate change effects and the policies that we can use to manage migrant and refugee flows.

Celebrating the anniversary



The Crisis Management and Disaster Response Centre of Excellence (CMDR COE) celebrates the eighth anniversary of its formal accreditation as an international military organisation - on March 31. The Centre gives a reception every year on this day.

The reception in the premises of CMDR COE was honoured by the presence of Ambassadors, Defence Attachüs and Embassies' representatives accredited in the Republic of Bulgaria as well as representatives from the Presidency of the Republic of Bulgaria, Ministry of Defence and the Defence Staff.

"A significant amount of time and efforts have been exerted to establish the CMDR COE as an institution meeting NATO's high standards and requirements for a hub of expertise in the CMDR domain. Importantly, bringing added value to the process of the Alliance's transformation and adaptation. The CMDR COE is continuously improving its products and performance, which deserves us the appreciation of the CMDR community of interest. Our capacity to act as a catalyst for transformation in the crisis and disaster management domain is closely contingent upon the ability to forge fruitful partnerships. Therefore, we seek to build a common ground for collaboration and exchange with relevant stakeholders. Excellence more than a mission for us - it is a firm conviction in the benefits of hard work and constructive cooperation, and we spare no effort on the way forward. We will continue to grow, improve and seek to contribute to a better and more inclusive crisis and disaster management", stated the CMDR COE Director Colonel Orlin Nikolov in his address to the ceremony.

Visit in Poland



The CMDR COE Director, Colonel Orlin Nikolov, accompanied by the Education and Training Branch Chief and Transformation Branch Chief; visited the Polish garrisons of Zegrze (the location of Polish Territorial Defense Command) and Bydgoszcz (the location of 8th Territorial Defense Brigade). The main aim of the visit was the familiarization with the structure and tasks of Territorial Defence Forces and its role and mission in terms of Crisis Management and Disaster Response. During the first two days the Centre's representatives were provided with the sets of briefings, informing about all the crucial aspects connected with the specificity of duty of those commands. Those presentations were followed by equipment static displays. In addition, the delegation had the opportunity to get familiar with civilian branches and cells cooperating with the army (Territorial Defence) at the level of the Voivode. The last day of the duty trip gave also the opportunity to visit

Polish Training and Doctrines Centre and Military Police Centre of Excellence (MP CoE). In both institution, the current and future cooperation in terms of education and training was discussed in details.

Hosting a course

The CMDR COE hosted a course on Hazard Prediction and Assessment Capability (HPAC), at the request of the Joint Force Command of the Armed Forces of the Republic of Bulgaria. The course was held from 3 to 7 April 2023, and was facilitated by the Defense Threat Reduction Agency. The training was provided to a group of 19 Bulgarian Armed Forces personnel, and its primary focus was on improving their knowledge and skills related to modelling and forecasting hazards in CBRN (chemical, biological, radiological, and nuclear) incidents. The course also included training on the use of the HPAC software package, which is a critical tool for assessing and predicting the impact of CBRN incidents.

Autumn 2022 Internship end

The CMDR COE Internship Research Paper presentation took place on 20 April 2023 in front of the CMDR COE team of experts. The intern Tjard Sattler has been actively involved in the everyday tasks of the Centre of Excellence since November 2022. Besides working on his research paper that focuses on the topic of "Cognitive Warfare impact on Strategic Decision-Making in NATO", he was contributing to the organization and smooth-running of the courses offered by the Centre.

Disaster Response and Consequence Management for a radiological incident



A pilot course of the Disaster Response and Consequence Management for a Radiological Incident was successfully carried out. The Centre together with the United States Department of Energy's Office of Nuclear Incident Policy and Cooperation (NIPC) and with the support of the JCBRN COE and the EADRC trained international military and civil experts with special equipment for detecting radiological materials and dealing with these threats to ensure public safety. The practical part of the course was executed at the Musachevo CBRN training area. The participants were able to practice what they had learned using protective equipment. The theoretical part focused on response objectives and monitoring and sampling strategies and lessons learned from past incidents such as Fukushima.

MTT in Estonia

What is NATO's crisis management process? How are strategic decisions made? What is the role of the military in humanitarian assistance and disaster relief? Why are cross-cutting topics such as gender perspectives and resilience essential components of a comprehensive approach to security? These formed the basis of discussions during the Joint Command and General Staff Course 2022-2023 / Managing Contemporary Crisis, organised by the Baltic Defence College in Tartu, Estonia. In the course of 5 days (24-28 April 2023), a CMDR COE Mobile Education and Training Team (METT) instructed a 60 + strong group of learners from different Allied and Partner nations, and engaged them in a practical exercise aimed at solidifying knowledge of key concepts and approaches. The result: constructive exchange, increased awareness, and

The role of crisis diplomacy



Crisis Management in Multilateral Framework (IGOs: The role of Political/Civilian and Military Crisis Diplomacy) Course was conducted in period 9-11 May 2023. A group of 21 attendees (face-to-face and online) from 5 countries participated.

The topics presented by international civil and military experts involved the meaning of multilateralism, how perception of what is a threat has changed, the shift from multilateral to bi-lateral and mini-lateral security relationships in the world and the importance of the strategic narrative for NATO. The practical part of the course was done using a negotiations exercise. The participants were divided in teams, representing three different countries. The

negotiations covered the areas of security, diplomacy, politics, the military, social policies, and economic issues.

The course was co-organised by the CMDR COE and the Bulgarian Diplomatic Institute to the Ministry of Foreign Affairs, with the involvement of experienced lecturers from a wide range of international governmental and non-gvernmental institutions. The goal is to provide wider overview on the complex nature of modern crises, highlighting the challenges to the existing security system and demonstrating the importance of the diplomatic tools in prevention and management of crises. The attendees gained theoretical knowledge and practical experiences about the usage of different diplomatic tools and Lessons Identified of cooperation among involved international stakeholders.

The event succeeded in providing insights into the Crisis Management fundamentals, with a focus on Political/Civilian and Military Diplomacy, alongsidethe respective policies, processes, tools and stakeholders.

The GFP course

The CMDR COE was delighted to welcome a group of military and civilian learners placed at the strategic and operational levels to the NATO-approved Gender Focal Point course that took place on 15-18 May 2023. Delivering the course face-to-face is something we have been looking forward to for over 3 years.

The group of highly motivated learners identified gendered stereotypes and biases; offered ways for improved awareness and understanding of gender in security and defence, and generated a wealth of ideas for advancing gender mainstreaming within their respective organisations. Learners practiced advocating for and supporting the implementation of NATO's commitments to the Women, Peace and Security agenda and familiarised with the importance of the Alliance's gender advisory structure in facilitating collaborative exchange.

The Eleventh Annual Conference of the Centre



The CMDR COE conductedits 11thcapstone event in a row. It took place from 31 May to 1 June 2023 and again was a platform for interaction and exchange among the CMDR community of interest SMEs from NATO, NATO Allies and Partners and participating organizations. This year's main topic of the conference was "Crisis Response to Newly Arising Worldwide Threats". It focused on the evolving security environment and the potential adaptive and comprehensive approach towards the arising security challenges in the Crisis Management and Disaster Response domain. Placing the focus on these themes, the annual conferencepaid high attention to adequate preparedness and timely adaption within the CMDR domain.

Cooperation agreement with GATE Institute



On 6 June 2023, the director of Big Data for Smart Society Institute (GATE), Professor Silvia Ilieva signed a framework agreement withour Centre. The document establishes future cooperation in the fields of emergency and crisis management, resilience building, disaster response and innovation in security and defence.

The GATE Institute was selectedin 2022 as a NATO test center in the field of big data and artificial intelligence as part of the NATO Defence Innovation Accelerator for the North Atlantic (DIANA). DIANA provides future opportunities for dual-use innovation, which will develop and strengthen the transatlantic innovation ecosystem. By cooperating with the CMDR COE, the institute will be able to gain valuable insights into NATO's latest priorities when it comes to new emerging technologies.

Practice of crisis management procedures

On 7 June 2023, a training session took place at the Bulgarian Ministry of Foreign Affairs about to practice crisis management procedures. The Situation Centre (SITCEN) Directorate organized the session, receiving support from various relevant ministries and departments. The objective of this training was to simulate a crisis scenario and evaluate the coordination and decision-making skills of the participants. Through collaboration, the aim was to identify optimal solutions and strategies to effectively address the crisis promptly. The involvement of CMDR COE in the training provided valuable opportunities for the experts to enhance their preparedness, strengthen communication channels, and establish a cohesive response framework for real-life crises.

Our Centre participated by contributing technical expertise and capabilities. The exchange of information and feedback between CMDR COE and the experts contributed to improving services and identifying emerging trends. Regular communication enabled CMDR COE to share their experiences and challenges with the experts. This ongoing training, dialogue, and feedback helped refine crisis response strategies and ensured that services were tailored to meet the evolving needs and responses in crises.

Disaster Risk Management course for the Jordanian Public Security Directorate



In the fulfilment of a project developed in the framework of the Updated Defense Capacity Building Package for Jordan (agreed by the Partnerships and Cooperative Security Committee with Jordan in June 2021), a Centre's mobile training team (MTT) conducted a five-day course in the Royal Police Academy in Amman, Jordan. For the time 11 - 16 June 2023 this Disaster Risk Management course trained a core group of Jordanian Public Security Directorate and key personnel from multiple local ministries and institutions. It was in support to the institutionalization of procedures and processes across different governmental levels. The CMDR COE team delivered advanced training and built knowledge, skills, as well as practical competences in the field of risk management, including identification, analysis and evaluation. Risk treatment, monitoring and costs estimation in the field of crisis and disaster management were also addressed.

A pilot course



CMDR COE welcomed a group of civil and military experts in a 4-day course - a pilot iteration of the Cognitive Warfare topic. The event provided and insightful overview the history and nature of the discipline. Key aspects of human cognition and contemporary info enviorment were addressed as well as the path to future activities, aimed at countering malign cognitive influence. Audience from four countries was actively engaged in discussions and brainstorming about countering cognitive warfare at a strategic level. Practical tasks resulted in various recommendations, which were presented to some senior governmental representatives on the last day of the course. Such demonstration places a key role of the pilot course as a starting point for further Allied common efforts aimed at countering malign cognitive influence.

A course in Bucharest - Disaster Relief in CSDP Context



Our Centre together with the Diplomatic Institute to the Minister of Foreign Affairs of Bulgaria and the Romanian National College of Home Affairs delivered the Disaster Relief in CSDP Context course. The event under the auspices of the European Security and Defence College was in the period 17 - 21 July 2023 in Bucharest.

This residential course brought together a group of people with civilian (diplomatic/consular, police, judicial, intelligence, humanitarian NGO staff) and military backgrounds, having expertise and operational experience in civil protection, disaster relief and/or humanitarian assistance. Gladly, there were big interest and presence of such personnel from Partnership countries.

Distinguished guests



On 28 August 2023, a delegation from Embassy of the Republic of Korea in Sofia led by H.E. Jongin Bae visited our Centre. The distinguished guests were introduced to the concept, vision, principles, COEs network, and specifically the organization of CMDR COE. Additionally, the Centre's branch chiefs presented the main activities and projects performed in their branches. It underlined the wide opportunities for possible contribution and collaboration. Such a process is open for all NATO and PfP members, as well as for NATO's Mediterranean Dialogue, Istanbul Cooperation Initiative, and Global partners. The guests expressed interest on the opportunities for non-NATO nations to collaborate with the Centre and the possible advantages of cooperation.

Collaboration with another university



On 14 September 2023, at the premises of the Crisis Management and Disaster Response Centre of Excellence (CMDR COE) in Sofia, Bulgaria, a Framework Collaboration Agreement has been signed between the CMDR COE and the University of National and World Economy (UNWE).

The Agreement stipulates the objectives and principles of future collaboration between the two Organisations whereas the main goal is to benefit from the academic knowledge in synergy with military expertise in order to promote, facilitate, and cooperate in the fields of emergency/crisis management, resilience, and disaster response. This includes, but it is not limited to education and training opportunities, research and development, and provision of subject matter expertise, based on the principles of reciprocity and mutual benefit.

A course for the Jordanian Public Security Directorate



In the fulfilment of a project developed in the framework of the Updated Defense Capacity Building Package for Jordan (agreed by the Partnerships and Cooperative Security Committee with Jordan in June 2021), Mobile Training Team (MTT) from the CMDR COE in close coordination with the Jordanian Public Security Directorate (PSD) conducted the "Multi-National Crisis Management Course".

The 5-day course, conducted in the Royal Police Academy in Amman, Jordan for the time 17-21 September, 2023 aimed to train a core group of Jordanian PSD staff and key personnel from multiple ministries and institutions, as well as governorates and thus supported the institutionalization of procedures and

processes across different governmental levels.

The CMDR COE team delivered advanced training and built knowledge, skills, as well as practical competences in the field of Crisis Management with a focus on political, civil and military diplomacy, including policies, processes, tools and stakeholders. The attendees listened presentations on crisis diplomacy, deployed policies, tools and actors in the contemporary security environment, NATO's cooperation with relevant IOs and NGOs as part of a Comprehensive Approach to security.
