# INVITATION TO ATTEND THE NATO EADRCC CONSEQUENCE MANAGEMENT EXERCISE "NORTH MACEDONIA 2021"

- 1. In November 2019, Allies agreed to conduct a civil emergency planning exercise in North Macedonia. That exercise is being jointly planned by the Euro-Atlantic Disaster Response Coordination Centre (EADRCC) and the Crisis Management Centre of the Republic of North Macedonia. The Exercise name is "NORTH MACEDONIA 2021".
- 2. In order to mitigate the risks presented by COVID-19, NATO and authorities in North Macedonia agreed to reschedule the exercise from 2020 to 2021, to reduce the scope and size of the exercise, and to make appropriate adjustments to the planned exercise events<sup>1</sup>. The exercise will be held from 20-23 Sep 2021 in Ohrid, North Macedonia.
- 3. Participants, support staff and observers of the Exercise are invited to register no later than 13 August 2021 by using the instructions provided at Annex 1. Participants in the VIP Symposium are invited to register before 1 September 2021.
- 4. An overview of the exercise is available at Annex 7.
- 5. The full set of exercise instructions is contained in the seven attached annexes. Please note that information in these instructions will be further elaborated as exercise planning progresses and redistributed accordingly in advance of the start of the exercise.

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#### **INVITATION - PRACTICAL ARRANGEMENTS**

- 1. A Final Planning Conference was held from 14 until 16 June 2021 in Ohrid, Republic of North Macedonia, The outcomes of the Final Planning Conference are captured in the attached exercise instructions.
- 2. The conference participants further elaborated the scenario and developed sections of the Exercise Instructions, including host nation support, border crossing, financial issues, medical support, and logistics. The outcomes of the Final Planning Conference are the basis for the conduct of the NATO EADRCC Consequence Management Exercise "NORTH MACEDONIA 2021" from 20 until 23 September 2021.
- 3. Apart from North Macedonia, 15 Allied and partner nations, the Balkan Medical Task Force (BMTF), the Crisis Management and Disaster Response Centre of Excellence (CMDR CoE), the Organization for Security and Co-operation in Europe (OSCE), the Multinational Peace Force South-Eastern Europe Brigade (SEEBRIG), and the Disaster Preparedness and Prevention Initiative for South-Eastern Europe (DPPI SEE) already indicated their willingness to participate in the consequence management exercise and/or to contribute exercise elements.
- 4. **Attendance**. As communicated earlier<sup>1</sup>, the exercise builds on 3 pillars: a field training exercise, a table top exercise and a VIP symposium. COVID-19 mitigation measures require the exercise organizers to limit the attendance in the Exercise as follows:
  - 1. Field Training Exercise (FTX): open to North Macedonia its neighbouring countries and the Next-Generation Incident Command System project participating nations. These nations<sup>2</sup> can bring one team consisting of 6 persons<sup>3</sup> to the Field Training Exercise.
  - 2. Table Top Exercise (TTX): open to all Allied and partner nations, NATO Military Authorities, NATO Commands, International and Non-Governmental Organizations. Each nation/organization can bring one team of 3 persons to the Table Top Exercise.
  - 3. Combined international participation in the FTX and TTX is limited to 100 persons, excluding Exercise Staff (Directing Staff and Evaluators).
  - 4. Should not all the slots (100/50) be taken, nations and international organizations may be offered additional attendance on a case-by-case basis.
  - 5. VIP Symposium: open to all Allied and partner nations, NATO Military Authorities, NATO Commands, International and Non-Governmental Organizations. Each nation can nominate high-level representatives for in-person attendance at the VIP Symposium.
  - 6. In-person participation at the VIP Symposium will be limited to 50 VIPs. There are no limits on the virtual participation (on-line streaming) to the VIP Symposium.
- 5. **Registration**. Participants in the Exercise are invited to register as follows:
  - 1. Participants in the Field Training Exercise are invited to submit the EADRU team registration forms at Annex 6 of this document to the EADRCC (nato.eadrcc@hq.nato.int) by Friday, 13 August 2021.
  - 2.   - 3. 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- 4. High-level participants for the symposium, which will consist of two panels ("Civil-Military Support to a Civil Emergency" and "Lessons from Disaster Response under COVID-19"), as well as an official dinner, are requested to register not later than Wednesday 25 August 2021 through on-line registration at link: https://eadrcc.cmdrcoe.org/menu.php?m id=40&c id=92. The password is EADRCCNM2021.
- 6. **Personal invitation letters** for the high-level participants are available on request through the EADRCC (nato.eadrcc@hq.nato.int) or the Crisis Management Center of the Republic of North Macedonia.
- 7. **Financial implications**. Sending nations are expected to pay all costs for participation in the exercise and symposium. NATO funds may be available to subsidise key participants from eligible partner nations whose organisations cannot cover the cost of their participation. For those eligible, and if funds are available, subsidies are provided only for travel and accommodation. No other expenses will be reimbursed (such as per diem, meals, out-of-schedule transportation to and from airport or train station, hotel incidentals, etc.). A policy for financial support to partner participation in NATO civil emergency planning related events is issued under AC/98(EAPC) N(2012)0010, MULTIREF.
- 8. All participants attending the exercise and/or symposium are required to be fully vaccinated against COVID-19 or present a negative PCR test of less than 72 hours. Upon arrival in North Macedonia, every participant will be submitted to an AntiGen test, free of charge, by the Ministry of Health of the Republic of North Macedonia.

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### **EXERCISE INSTRUCTIONS**

"NORTH MACEDONIA 2021"







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#### GENERAL ISSUES

#### 1. Introduction

- 1.1. The Exercise Instructions reflect the agreements reached by the parties organizing the Consequence Management Exercise "NORTH MACEDONIA 2021", that is to be held from 20 to 23 September 2021 in the Republic of North Macedonia.
- 1.2. The specific framework of the Exercise (dates and programme) can be found at "Draft programme for "NORTH MACEDONIA 2021"" on page 2.35.
- All details regarding the host nation support can be found at ANNEX 3. 1.3.
- 1.4. The organizational costs for the exercise will be borne by the host nation and NATO. Limited NATO funds will be available to subsidize partner nations' participation that are eligible for financial support. Financial arrangements are specified at "Financial arrangements" on page 2.57.
- It is expected that military formations participating in the exercise will work in the spirit of the Oslo 1.5. Guidelines. In addition, the Memorandum of Understanding on the Facilitation of Vital Civil Cross Border Transport<sup>1</sup> will be applicable during the preparation and conduct of the exercise, subject to consultations with the host nation.
- 1.6. Elements of these exercise instructions may be subject to change and each organizing party will inform the other of such changes.

#### 2. **Revised concept**

- 2.1. To ensure a safe conduct of the NATO EADRCC Consequence Management Exercise "NORTH MACEDONIA 2021", the leadership of NATO and the authorities of the Republic of North Macedonia agreed on a revised and scaled-down exercise.
- 2.2. The revised exercise includes three pillars of activity, each isolated in separate "COVID-19 bubbles":
  - A Field Training Exercise (FTX): International participation in the FTX is limited to small teams 2.2.1. from the host nation's neighbouring countries and the NICS project participants: Albania, Bosnia and Herzegovina, Bulgaria, Croatia, Greece, Montenegro and Serbia.
  - A Table-Top Exercise (TTX): participation in the TTX is open to all NATO and partner nations, 2.2.2. NATO commands, NATO Agencies and Centres of Excellence, and selected/interested international and non-governmental organizations.
  - A VIP Symposium on "Civil-Military Support to a Civil Emergency" and "Lessons from Disaster 2.2.3. Response under COVID-19 Conditions"; with views by panellists and a moderated discussion between high-level representatives of NATO, Allied and partner nations, international organizations and non-governmental organizations. The symposium will be broadcast on the internet.
- With the help of the Public Diplomacy Division of NATO Headquarters a tour with selected media outlets 2.3. and journalists, to highlight the Republic of North Macedonia as a reliable partner in providing security within and beyond the North Atlantic Area, will be provided.



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2.4. Within this document "the exercise" and the "consequence management exercise" include both the field training (FTX) and table top (TTX) components of the NATO EADRCC Consequence Management Exercise NORTH MACEDONIA 2021. There shall be an explicit mention to which specific component (FTX or TTX) a section or instruction is applicable only.

## 3. Exercise description

- 3.1. The name of this exercise is "**NORTH MACEDONIA 2021**".
- 3.2. As agreed by the Civil Emergency Planning Committee, a consequence management exercise will be conducted from 20 to 23 September 2021, jointly organized by the Euro-Atlantic Disaster Response Coordination Centre (EADRCC) of the North Atlantic Treaty Organization (NATO) and the Crisis Management Center of the Republic of North Macedonia, the host nation.
- 3.3. The exercise will be preceded by a training programme and guided discussions with the aim to train and exercise procedures for the Local Emergency Management Authority (LEMA), the United Nations models for the On-Site Operation Coordination Centre (OSOCC), the Urban Search and Rescue Coordination Cell (UCC) and the Emergeny Medical Teams Coordination Cell (EMTCC), as well as liaison officers and team leaders of participating consequence management teams. These entities will be stood up immediately following the training on 20 September, as to ensure a "hot start" of the tasks (FTX and TTX) on 21 September.
- 3.4. The scenario for the exercise is based on urban search and rescue operations, mountain search and rescue, flood response, response to chemical, biological or radiological incidents and fake news campaigns which will affect the civil population and critical infrastructure in the area around the cities of Ohrid and Struga. The tabletop exercise will cover a larger area around these municipalities.
- 3.5. The agreed lead-in scenario can be found at "Lead-in scenario" on page 2.17. Exercise planners from the Directing Staff (DISTAFF) working group will develop events, incidents and injects in order to: 1) create an interesting play for the teams, 2) challenge the coordination mechanisms and, 3) meet the exercise objectives. The resulting list of events will be circulated as an independent document to members of the Directing Staff on a "need to know" principle.



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### 4. Exercise location

- 4.1. The field training exercise will be conducted at 10 sites, all located in the vicinity of the cities of Ohrid and Struga, whereas the table-top participants will work from a building in the Base of Operations. Teams participating in the exercise should arrive no later than Sunday 19 September 2021 in order to be accommodated, to receive information, and to prepare for the activities. Departure of teams will be from 24 September 2021. Date and hours mentioned in these exercise instructions are in local time (UTC+2 hours), unless stated otherwise.
- 4.2. The exercise sites are named as follows:

- 4.3. Upon arrival, participating teams will be provided with a map of the exercise area, indicating the exercise sites.
- 4.4. The DISTAFF will adjust the type and intensity of the events in accordance with the types and skills of teams.

# 5. Exercise Programme

- 5.1. The exercise (FTX and TTX) will consist of three phases (detail in "Draft programme for "NORTH MACEDONIA 2021"" on page 2.35):
  - 5.1.1. Phase one: 19 and 20 September 2021: arrival of the teams in the host country, demonstration of team skills, preparations and training, including guided discussions and workshops among professionsals.
  - 5.1.2. Phase two: 21 to 23 September 2021: field training exercise and table-top exercise, the core part of the exercise and hot-wash meetings; and
  - 5.1.3. Phase three: 24 September 2021: departure of the teams and other participants.

- 6.2. The host nation should coordinate invitations to the exercise with full transparency to NATO Allies. Participation of parties other than those listed above will need to be signalled in advance and agreed upon by NATO Allies through the Civil Emergency Planning Committee (CEPC).



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### 7. The overall aim of the exercise

7.1. Exercises play a vital role in both national and international preparedness by enabling stakeholders at all levels to test and validate specific plans, procedures and capabilities. This exercise also provides an excellent opportunity to identify gaps and to highlight areas requiring further improvement.

# 8. Exercise main objectives

- 8.1. Support the authorities of the Republic of North Macedonia in building resilience through improved disaster preparedness, planning, prevention and response, and strengthen their capability to manage emergencies.
- 8.2. National certification and operationalisation by the Republic of North Macedonia of the Next-Generation Incident Command System (NICS), developed by the NATO Science for Peace and Security programme.
- 8.3. Practice the modalities and practical implications of the memorandum of understanding<sup>2</sup> on the facilitation of vital civil cross border transport.

#### 9. Execution

- 9.1. The lead-in scenario, the situation at the start of the exercise and the map of the exercise are at "Lead-in scenario" on page 2.17 and "Exercise Area" on page 2.19, respectively.
- 9.2. The planning responsibility for exercise "**NORTH MACEDONIA 2021**" is assigned to the representatives of the Republic of North Macedonia and the EADRCC, as well as the Directing Staff (DISTAFF) working group comprising planners from participating NATO and partner nations, international organisations and NATO Civil Experts.

# 10. Coordinating instructions

- 10.1. During the exercise, approved procedures and documents will be followed. In particular, the "non binding guidelines for the planning, conduct and evaluation of international exercises"<sup>3</sup>, will be applied. Lessons identified from previous exercises will be implemented as appropriate.
- 10.2. All the participants are strongly advised to ensure that staff is fully conversant with the content of relevant documents and are following the guidance contained in the relevant instructions.
- 10.3. Parties organising the exercise are responsible for the conduct of the exercise as well as for issuing appropriate supporting exercise instructions.
- 10.4. The media activities are specified in the Public Information Strategy at "Public information Strategy" on page 2.55.

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# 11. Command and management

- 11.1. Officers conducting the exercise (OCE):
  - 11.1.1. The Republic of North Macedonia: Crisis Management Center;
  - 11.1.2. NATO International Staff: Euro-Atlantic Disaster Response Coordination Centre, Defence Institution and Capacity Building, Operations Division, North Atlantic Treaty Organization.
- 11.2. <u>The Directing Staff (DISTAFF)</u> will have members from NATO International Staff, and participating NATO and partner nations, international organizations and NATO Civil Experts.
  - 11.2.1. The DISTAFF role is to direct and control the exercise play in order to achieve the exercise objectives. Instructions issued by the DISTAFF are binding for players. The DISTAFF will be fully independent and physically separated from the players. The DISTAFF will have complete freedom of action and unlimited access to all information in order to fulfil its function.
  - 11.2.2. National personnel in Simulation Teams (role-players) will assist the DISTAFF to accomplish the aims and objectives of the exercise;
  - 11.2.3. Members of the DISTAFF should arrive at the exercise venue not later than 19 September 2021.

# 11.3. Emergency termination and emergency suspension:

11.3.1. If an emergency occurs, which warrants the temporary suspension or termination of the exercise, the officers conducting the exercise may terminate or suspend the exercise by transmitting a no-play ("NO PLAY - NO PLAY - NO PLAY") message to the Directing Staff.

### 11.4. <u>Communication and Information Systems (CIS)</u>:

- 11.4.1. An Information and Communication Technology (ICT) Support Unit will provide communication equipment and ensure proper communication for OSOCC, UCC, EMTCC, LEMA, DISTAFF and evaluators
- 11.4.2. Heads of the DISTAFF, OSOCC, UCC, EMTCC and evaluators are obliged to familiarize the members of their staff with the communication procedures.
- 11.4.3. Coordination and communication instructions for the exercise are at "Coordination and communication" on page 2.49.

### 11.5. Occupational safety:

- 11.5.1. It is a paramount goal of the planning team to ensure safety and security during the exercise. It is meant not only for participants in the Field Training and Table Top Exercises but also for all the involved participants such as role players, exercise staff and simulated media personnel.
- 11.5.2. There will be a Safety and Security Coordinator from the DISTAFF responsible for overall coordination of Safety and Security.
- 11.5.3. The Republic of North Macedonia will provide dedicated safety and security advisers from Protection and Rescue Directorate, the Red Cross, the Fire Fighter units and the Ministry of Interior to the On-site Commanders at each exercise site.
- 11.5.4. The Republic of North Macedonia will appoint a COVID-19 Safety Officer and security advisers from the Ministry of Health and other competent authorities who will monitor the implementation of governing safety measures at all the sites were paticipants gather, including the hotels.



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### 12. Public information and media play

- 12.1. A Public Information Centre (PIC)<sup>4</sup> will be established at the Base of Operations, during the exercise, to participate in media play and interact with simulated press, or SIMPRESS. The Public Information Centre will cover both the field as well as the table top exercise.
- 12.2. The Public Information Centre is a function of the Local Emergency Management Authority (LEMA) and does not interact with real-world media during the exercise. Its role is to ensure coordination of public information throughout the exercise. It will be manned by representatives from the Republic of North Macedonia. Each ministry of North Macedona and Non-Governmental Organization (NGO) participating in the exercise should delegate at minimum one representative to the Public Information Centre.
- 12.3. The Public Information Centre will be expected to educate exercise players on the role of the PIC and what they are meant to do when encountered by members of the SIMPRESS.
- 12.4. The SIMPRESS team is part of the DISTAFF and will be clearly identifiable by yellow vests provided by NATO. The role of the SIMPRESS is to exercise North Macedonia its coordination of information between the media and the PIC, LEMA and OSOCC in a crisis situation.
- 12.5. The use of social media in emergencies will be exercised in a closed simulation environment with the aim to capture the public perception and to counter false information.

# 13. Testing the Memorandum of Understanding on the Facilitation of Vital Civil Cross Border Transport

- 13.1. Cross-border cooperation among neighbouring countries is one of the three objectives which are to be achieved within the framework of this exercise.
- 13.2. Most nations participating in the field training exercise are also MoU Participants<sup>5</sup> (MoU signatory states), which provides an excellent opportunity to test the practical application of the MoU, not least because of the different means of transport that national teams plan to use to reach the Republic of North Macedonia. MoU Participants and other nations participating in exercise "NORTH MACEDONIA 2021" are invited to consider testing the following issues/provisions:
  - 13.2.1. The implementation of border crossing procedures and how they are applied (dissemination of the MoU, development and implementation of additional arrangements etc.).
  - 13.2.2. Structures involved in the facilitation of cross-border movements, their functions and how they work.
  - 13.2.3. The time taken to transport relief personnel and material from the sending state to the requesting state.
  - 13.2.4. The type of facilitation given by the transiting state(s) and the requesting state.
  - 13.2.5. Other agreements/arrangements which were applied, and how they work.

Signatory States of the MoU: Albania, Armenia, Austria, Bosnia and Herzegovina, Bulgaria, Canada, Croatia, Denmark, Estonia, Finland, Georgia, Germany, Greece, Hungary, Lithuania, Luxembourg, Republic of Moldova, The Netherlands, Norway, Poland, Portugal, Romania, Slovakia, Slovenia, Spain, Sweden, North Macedonia, Turkey, Ukraine, United Kingdom, United States of America.



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#### 14. **Next-Generation Incident Command System**

- NATO Allies and partner nations in the Western Balkans acquired, deployed and customised to their 14.1. own need the Next-Generation Incident Command System (NICS) as to enhance situational awareness and help coordinate the responses to incidents – whether natural or man-made – in their countries.
- Supported by the NATO Science for Peace and Security (SPS) Programme, the system, once in place, will maximise real-time situational awareness and help find a coordinated, appropriate response to emergencies. It will also enhance interoperability among emergency response teams in the region.
- 14.3. NICS is a web-based command and control platform for incidents that facilitates collaboration among first responders. Sharing of information via mobile devices in areas of disadvantaged, intermittent or limited communications as quickly as possible will contribute to saving lives, reducing loss of property and resources, and protecting the environment. The system will be especially useful in a region prone to natural disasters.
- The project is led by the Massachusetts Institute of Technology Lincoln Laboratory (MIT LL) in the United States, together with civil emergency and disaster response agencies from Bosnia and Herzegovina, Croatia, Montenegro and the Republic of North Macedonia, which have developed and implemented the NIC System.
- The system will be tested during the exercise by the teams of the countries, participating in the project, international organizations and host nation representatives Other participating nations are strongly encouraged to also use the NIC System during the exercise.
- Mobile devices, and training, to use the system will be provided by the host nation during the Final 14.6. Planning Conference and at the training day of the exercise.
- North Macedonia may invite MIT LL and the other NICS project nations to augment the NICS specialists pool for training and national evaluation purposes. These additional people will be accounted for as host nation assets and, therefore, do not count agains the number of international participants.

#### 15. **Evaluation**

- An independent multinational evaluation team will be established to evaluate the consequence management exercise. Terms of Reference for the Evaluation Team are at "Terms of reference for the Exercise Staff" on page 2.59.
- In order to get a realistic evaluation of participating units' capabilities to respond to an emergency 15.2. situation, those individuals who participate in the planning for the exercise must not be involved in the exercise as players. This will assure that activities during the exercise will be as close to reality as possible.
- 15.3. The evaluation process will comprise the following stages:
  - 15.3.1. A hot-wash after the Field Exercise on 23 September 2021 as part of exercise phase two;
  - 15.3.2. The teams' evaluation reports:
  - 15.3.3. The Final Evaluation Report:
  - 15.3.4. A lessons identified conference (24-26 January 2022) at the premises of the Crisis Management and Disaster Response Centre of Excellence (CMDR CoE) in Sofia, Bulgaria;
  - 15.3.5. An EADRCC Post Exercise Report prepared by the EADRCC; and
  - 15.3.6. A presentation of the EADRCC Post Exercise Report to the Civil Emergency Planning Committee (CEPC).



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- 15.4. On Thursday 23 September 2021, a hot-wash will be conducted, during which the exercise planners, the DISTAFF and team leaders will have an opportunity to exchange views on the conduct of the exercise. The outcome of the hot-wash will be incorporated in the EADRCC Post Exercise Report.
- 15.5. The Head of the Evaluators Team will submit her Final Evaluation Report on exercise "NORTH MACEDONIA 2021" to the EADRCC by 15 December 2021.
- 15.6. Based on the evaluation reports and the findings of the participants, the EADRCC will prepare a draft Post Exercise Report. A lessons identified conference will be organized on 24-26 January 2022, at the premises of the Crisis Management and Disaster Response Centre of Excellence (Sofia, Bulgaria), to discuss and finalize the draft Post Exercise Report for submission to CEPC.

# 16. Training Activities

- 16.1. The following training activities for teams will be organised and offered during phase one:
  - 16.1.1. Parallel sessions of workshops among professionals will be organised for the following categories of teams: CBRN, Urban Search and Rescue (SAR) and Mountain SAR, Water SAR, and medical emergency teams.
  - 16.1.2. An occupational safety awareness briefing will be offered to all exercise participants.
  - 16.1.3. The Civil Protection Group experts on public information in crises will offer media training for teams and public information personnel. Considering that the new version of the NATO CEP Budapest Guidelines includes a section on social media, the media training programme will include an awareness training on the use of social media in emergencies.
  - 16.1.4. Training, combined with a Virtual Reality Command Post Exercise, to set up and test the command structures involving staff members of the directing staff (DISTAFF), Local Emergency Management Authority (LEMA), Public Information Centre (PIC), On-Site Operations Coordination Centre (OSOCC), Urban Search And Rescue Coordination Cell (UCC), Emergency Medical Teams Coordination Cell (EMTCC), Joint Drones Operations Coordination Cell (JDOCC) as well as liaison officers and team commanders. Upon completion of this training and exercise, the coordination elements will stand-up themselves.
  - 16.1.5. A further introduction and hands-on training will be provided to selected members of the international teams and international organizations on the use of the Next-Generation Incident Command System (NICS).
- 16.2. Pending on interest and requests of the participants, additional training activities may be organized.



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# 17. Safety and security

- 17.1. All participants regardless of their mode of travel (plane, train, or vehicle) will be met at the state border by a representative of the Crisis Management Center and Ministry of Interior of the Republic of North Macedonia.
- 17.2. The police force of the host nation will be responsible for the security and protection of the exercise participants.
- 17.3. The Base of Operations and exercise sites will be guarded on a 24/7 basis.
- 17.4. All the participating teams will receive detailed briefings about the safety and security plan and procedures upon arrival. All exercise participants will be provided with name tags that should be worn visibly at all times.



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#### **LEAD-IN SCENARIO**

- 1. On 18 September 2021 at 11:03h local time, a powerful 8.2 Richter scale (5 km deep) earthquake struck the wider area of the city of Ohrid in the municipality of Ohrid, Republic of North Macedonia. The epicentre is located in Ohrid Lake (41°02'14"N 20°43'08"E). The effects were felt in the neighbouring municipalities, as well as the capital city of Skopje.
- 2. Initial reports indicate that a large number of older residential buildings are heavily damaged or completely collapsed. Many were injured and the number of casualties is still unknown. The population in the affected area refuses to return to their homes in fear of aftershocks.
- 3. As a consequence of the earthquake, a seiche¹ with waves up to 7m high occurred on Lake Ohrid. At least one settlement is flooded, and the lake is full of debris. Therefore, there is a risk of contamination. Ohrid Lake is the city's main water supply; rumours of possible contamination are spreading, and thus water quality control activities are necessary.
- 4. Electricity and water infrastructures were severely damaged, but road and telecommunication infrastructures suffered only minor damage from the landslides.
- 5. Banks had to close their business and Automatic Teller Machines (ATMs) are out of order due to power outages in Ohrid and Struga. Some (social) media published fake news of cyber-attacks against the banks and also spread rumours that the entire banking system in the Republic of North Macedonia has collapsed. Large groups of citizens gathered at several locations in Ohrid in front of the banks. ATMs were looted and destroyed.
- 6. Heavy damage is reported in the wider area of the city of Struga, located 12 km north of the epicentre. Unofficial reports indicate that the industrial zone in Struga suffered the most severe damage, possibly with a high number of casualties.
- 7. News media indicate that the earthquake generated a series of accidents in a large factory located between the two affected cities. As the disaster occurred during working hours, an unknown number of workers are missing or unaccounted for. Furthermore, there are reports of chemical leakages and fires with strange smells spreading in the vicinity of the factory.
- 8. Additionally, official representatives of a hydropower plant, at one of the accumulation lakes in the vicinity of the affected municipalities, reported structural damage of a bridge and possible casualties in a fisherman's settlement.
- 9. An aircraft on a scouting assignment lost control and crashed in the mountains in the vicinity of Ohrid.
- 10. Part of an international smuggling group from the Republic of North Macedonia have abused the situation in the region to establish a new Balkan route for the illegal transit of migrants, through Ohrid and Struga, having EU-countries as their final destination.
- 11. Domestic assets are mainly focused on the rescue activities in the Ohrid residential area.
- 12. Due to the severity of the consequences and the situation in the field, Authorities of the Republic of North Macedonia will most likely issue a request for international assistance through the Euro-Atlantic Disaster Response Coordination Centre (EADRCC).
- A seiche (pronounced "saysh") is a series of standing waves in a fully or partially enclosed body of water, caused by earthquakes or landslides.



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

1.1. Date and time: 19 September 2020, 08:00h (UTC+2)

#### 2. General situation

## 2.1. Initial emergency:

2.1.1. On 18 September 2021 at 11:03h local time, a powerful 8.2 Richter scale (5 km deep) earthquake struck the wider area of the city of Ohrid in the municipality of Ohrid, Republic of North Macedonia. The epicentre is located in Ohrid Lake (41°02'14"N 20°43'08"E). The effects were felt in the neighbouring municipalities, as well as the capital city of Skopje.

## 2.2. Secondary emergency:

2.2.1. As a consequence of the earthquake, a seiche¹ with waves up to 7m high occured on Lake Ohrid. At least one settlement is flooded, and the lake is full of debris. Therefore, there is a risk of contamination. Ohrid Lake is the city's main water supply; rumours of possible contamination are spreading, and thus water quality control activities are necessary.

## 2.3. Consequences:

- 2.3.1. Initial reports indicate that a large number of older residential buildings are heavily damaged or completely collapsed. Many were injured and the number of casualties is still unknown. The population in the affected area refuses to return to their homes in fear of aftershocks.
- 2.3.2. Electricity and water infrastructures were severely damaged, but road and telecommunication infrastructures suffered only minor damage from the landslides.
- 2.3.3. Banks had to close their business and Automatic Teller Machines (ATMs) are out of order due to power outages in Ohrid and Struga. Some (social) media published fake news of cyber-attacks against the banks and also spread rumours that the entire banking system in the Republic of North Macedonia has collapsed. Large groups of citizens gathered at several locations in Ohrid in front of the banks. ATMs were looted and destroyed.
- 2.3.4. Heavy damage is reported in the wider area of the city of Struga, located 12 km north of the epicentre. Unofficial reports indicate that the industrial zone in Struga suffered the most severe damage, possibly with a high number of casualties.
- 2.3.5. News media indicate that the earthquake generated a series of accidents in a large factory located between the two affected cities. As the disaster occurred during working hours, an unknown number of workers are missing or unaccounted for. Furthermore, there are reports of chemical leakages and fires with strange smells spreading in the vicinity of the factory.
- 2.3.6. Additionally, official representatives of a hydropower plant, at one of the accumulation lakes in the vicinity of the affected municipalities, reported structural damage of a bridge and possible casualties in a fisherman's settlement.

A seiche (pronounced "saysh") is a series of standing waves in a fully or partially enclosed body of water, caused by earthquakes or landslides.

## 9. Response co-ordination:

9.1. With a view in providing a coordinated response to the Republic of North Macedonia its requirements, nations and international organizations in a position to meet these demands, in full or in part, are invited to reply to the Operational Point of Contact of the stricken nation, with an information copy to the EADRCC, by any of the communcation means listed above.



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#### COORDINATION AND COMMUNICATION

#### 1. Coordination

- 1.1. The designated emergency operation centre of the government of the affected state is known internationally as the Local Emergency Management Authority (LEMA). As agreed in the EAPC Policy on "Enhanced Practical Cooperation in the Field of International Disaster Relief" national teams will remain under their own control while deployed to the stricken nation, but under operational direction of the LEMA. Also, in case of a major disaster, the United Nations Office for the Coordination of Humanitarian Affairs (UN-OCHA) may deploy an United Nations Disaster Assessment and Coordination (UNDAC) team to establish an On-Site Operations Coordination Centre (OSOCC) to assist the local government authorities in co-ordinating international assistance. The Head of the OSOCC will be called OSOCC Manager.
- 1.2. All relief and rescue actions will remain the responsibility of the receiving state. The LEMA will be the tasking authority. The Head of the LEMA will be called the LEMA Commander. The LEMA will operate as the strategic and operational control centre for national and international resources, while the OSOCC, will act as the coordinator for all international assistance. Cooperation between these two entities is therefore of the utmost importance. For that purpose the OSOCC will be deployed and physically located near the LEMA.
- 1.3. What distinguishes the OSOCC methodology from other functional organizational models is that functions and cells are expected to operate with a large degree of autonomy, servicing primarily the OSOCC's clients rather than reporting to the UNDAC Team Leader. In particular, coordination cells linked to the Operations Function of an OSOCC may, in many cases, be separated from the main OSOCC facility.
- 1.4. Many countries have adopted components from the OSOCC concept and integrated them into their national contingency plans. For example, EMT coordination will, in many cases, be nationally led as part of the Ministry of Health (MoH) emergency planning and may be operational even before the OSOCC is fully functional. Other operational coordination cells normally associated with the OSOCC, like the RDC or the USAR coordination cell (UCC), may also be operationalized and managed by national authorities and be the natural point of contact for international relief teams.
- 1.5. In these cases, the OSOCC may only be supporting these coordination cells with staff, equipment, and information management and analysis capacities. The coordination cells will report directly to the respective Government body, while links with the OSOCC will be maintained and information shared for overall analysis of need and response. In order to be able to accomplish the co-ordinator role, Liaison Officers (LOs) from all international teams will receive tasking requests and direction from the Urban Search and Rescue Coordination Cell (UCC). The most experienced international team leader may be requested to lead the UCC.
- 1.6. The main tasks of the international Liaison Officers will be:
  - 1.6.1. To inform the UCC on the composition and capabilities of their national teams;
  - 1.6.2. To assist in the planning for the optimal use of all international resources (tasks, rotation, etc.);
  - 1.6.3. To serve as a point of contact between their teams and the UCC/OSOCC.
  - 1.6.4. To inform the UCC about all activities undertaken during the operations conducted by their team(s) (progress, problems encountered, solutions for the problems, assistance needed, etc.); and
  - 1.6.5. To provide team leaders with taskings from the UCC.



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- 1.7. For this exercise, within the Chain of Co-ordination, Command and Control, four functional levels have been identified:
  - 1.7.1. The <u>Policy Level</u>, which assesses the situation and decides on the role of the entire rescue operation, based on applicable laws and operational procedures;
  - 1.7.2. The <u>Strategic Command</u>, which decides on the level of preparedness and the operational framework. In addition, this functional level has the responsibility for the strategic and tactical use of all resources, national as well as international. This functional level is carried out by the Government of North Macedonia in conjunction with the LEMA;
  - 1.7.3. The <u>Operational Command</u> is executed by the LEMA in close cooperation with the OSOCC. Tasking and orders are given to different international and national teams.
  - 1.7.4. The <u>On-Site Command</u>, which conducts the integrated command of one ongoing operation within the operational framework provided by the LEMA, and co ordinates the response efforts of the teams on site. Each operational site needs its On-Site Commander;
- 1.8. The Team Leaders work at the tactical level and report to the On-Site commander and their national authorities.
- 1.9. The LEMA Commander decides on the use of available resources in accordance with operational plans. Based on available resources, LEMA will either:
  - 1.9.1. issue an order to deploy national team(s); or
  - 1.9.2. issue a request for deployment of international team(s) to the UCC.
- 1.10. All relevant information (location, task(s) as well as assigned national and/or requested international resources) will be provided to the On-site Commander so that he/she can carry out the tasks described above.
- 1.11. Every Team Leader, prior to deployment, has to agree to the tasks assigned, based on the skills of the team and the available equipment.
- 1.12. Team Leaders have to report the results of their operations to the On-Site Commander as well as to the UCC/OSOCC through the Liaison Officers (LO).

#### 2. Joint Drone Operations Coordination Cell

- 2.1. The LEMA shall have direct control over the Joint Drone Operations Coordination Cell (JDOCC). This cell will gather all national and international drone capabilities, as to maximize the use of the available assets.
- 2.2. The LEMA tasks the JDOCC what team (national or international) to deploy. It must not only take into account the required capability, but also the security implications spawning from the requested operation.
- 2.3. Upon request, and approval by LEMA, the OSOCC can also request the use of the JDOCC capabilities.

## 3. Civil-Military Coordination

- 3.1. Civil-Military Coordination between LEMA and OSOCC, and between the national military and foreign military assets will be exercised in the Table Top Exercise.
- 3.2. Nations are welcome to declare the availability of Foreign Military Assets in their response to the request for international assistance.
- 3.3. The Foreign Military Assets will not deploy physically, but the exercise intends to test the coordination and communication mechanisms related to Civil-Military Coordination in a civil emergency.



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#### 4. Communication

- 4.1. The members of DISTAFF, LEMA and OSOCC as well as the LO's and On-site Commanders will be equipped with sufficient radio communication equipment, telephone sets and computers. North Macedonia and the ICT Support Unit will provide the required number of radios and other communication means, e.g. VHF repeater stations, as determined by the organising parties.
- 4.2. Communications between the LOs and the UCC will be done in English.
- 4.3. Internal tactical communications can be conducted in other languages.
- 4.4. International teams and North Macedonia its teams are expected to bring and use their own communication means for internal (tactical) communication in the Field Training Exercise:
  - 4.4.1. Permission from the Host Nation is necessary for the use of one's own communication equipment for internal communications.
  - 4.4.2. The host nation will coordinate the use of frequencies by the international and national teams. In accordance with the "Procedures for the Use of the Euro-Atlantic Disaster Response Unit (EADRU) in International Disaster Relief"<sup>2</sup>, participating nations should provide the Republic of North Macedonia with all the information concerning the means of communication (frequencies, technical details, etc.) to be used. Accuracy of such information is vital to the success of any consequence management mission.
  - 4.4.3. All related data should be sent to the host nation **not later than 31 July 2021** with an info copy to the EADRCC. This requirement for coordination of frequencies is emphasised in the Tampere Convention on the "Provision of Telecommunication Resources for Disaster Mitigation and Relief Operations".
- 2.5. Working and backup channel frequencies will be communicated to participating teams **not later than 30 August 2021**.

### 5. Reporting

- 5.1. The LEMA will submit daily reports to the EADRCC. These reports should be formatted as per "Format for daily report from LEMA to EADRCC" on page 2.53.
- 5.2. The basic minimum content of the daily reports is at "Format for daily report from LEMA to EADRCC" on page 2.53.
- 5.3. Reports have to cover a 24-hour period from 00:00h to 24:00h, and should reach the EADRCC not later than 06.00 UTC.
- 5.4. The OSOCC will submit its daily reports to the LEMA not later than 24.00 local time (OSOCC guidelines should be utilised).
- 5.5. All written communications, which will be transmitted during the exercise, must carry the first line identifier "Exercise NORTH MACEDONIA 2021 Exercise". The last line of the message should read "Exercise Exercise Exercise".
- 5.6. All reports will be posted on the "Virtual OSOCC" website<sup>3</sup>.






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#### 6. Structure of coordination and communication

- 1.3. **Press releases** will be released simultaneously by NATO and the Republic of North Macedonia authorities.
- 1.3.1. An initial press release, providing basic information to the media and the public, will be issued on 19 September 2021. This press release will include an accreditation form as established by the authorities of North Macedonias as well as information on the visa procedures required to enter the country.
- 1.3.2. The press release will be distributed by:
- 1.3.2.1. NATO through its usual channels,
- 1.3.2.2. Allied Contact Point Embassies, and
- 1.3.2.3. the authorities of the Republic of North Macedonia.
- 1.3.3. A final media advisory will be released to the accredited journalists by the Republic of North Macedonia its authorities.



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#### 1.4. Media activities and arrangements:

- 1.4.1. Real-world media will participate at the opening and closing ceremonies. They will not participate in the exercise and will be dealt with off-site by the Republic of North Macedonia. NATO will provide real-world media with visual credentials, so that they are clearly identifiable.
- 1.4.2. A **Public Information Centre** will be established at the Base of Operations by North Macedonia to participate in media play and interact with simulated press, or SIMPRESS. The Public Information Centre is a part of the exercise and a function of the Local Emergency Management Authority, or LEMA. **The Public Information Centre does not interact with real-world media** during the exercise. Its role is to ensure coordination of public information throughout the exercise. The SIMPRESS are a part of DISTAFF and will be clearly identifiable by yellow vests provided by NATO.
- 1.5. During the exercise, on an ad-hoc basis, a synthesis of the day with pictures and statistics will be provided to the real-world press.
- 1.6. NATO and the Republic of North Macedonia will ensure that real-world journalists will have interview opportunities with officials.
- 1.7. **A press conference** for real-world media will be arranged at the Base of Operations on 20 September 2021, immediately following the end of the opening ceremony.

#### 2. Rolling script:

2.1. The Office of the NATO Spokesperson will develop and circulate to all participating nations a Rolling Script including key media messages and reactive lines.



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#### FINANCIAL ARRANGEMENTS

- 1. All costs for participation in planning conferences and/or the exercise will have to be paid by the participants of the sending nations.
- 2. Contrary to previous exercises and because of COVID-19, preference is given to accommodate all the teams in hotels.
- 3. In accordance with the NATO funding policy for participants or teams from eligible partner countries who are not able to cover the full cost of their participation in the conferences or the exercise, **limited NATO** funds may be available to subsidise costs for travel and accommodation for a limited number of partner participants.
- 3.1. In line with applicable NATO policy, and subject to funds availability, eligible partner country's travel and accommodation costs will be either subsidized or reimbursed on the basis of actual expenses upon presentation of relevant invoices.
- 3.2. Subsidization or reimbursement of participation costs will only cover up to 100% of travel expenses and accommodation costs, specifically:
- 3.2.1. Travel costs will cover land or air (economy) transportation to and from the location of the event.
- 3.2.2. Accommodation costs will cover the price of the hotel room (including taxes) and breakfast for the duration of the event plus two days for travel (one before and one after the event to allow appropriate transport connections).
- 3.3. All other expenses (including per diem, meals, transportation to and from airport or train station, incidentals, etc.) will not be reimbursed.

- 1.3. 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## 2. Directing Staff (DISTAFF)

- 2.1. **Objective**: The success of the exercise depends on the DISTAFF's ability to create a realistic scenario, to prepare challenging but safe exercise sites and to control the exercise.
- 2.2. **Composition of the team**: DISTAFF will be composed of the head of DISTAFF, deputies and team members in the DISTAFF HQ and at the exercise sites, with responsibilities detailed in the list of positions ("List of positions within the DISTAFF" on page 2.61).

## 2.3. Roles and responsibilities:

- 2.3.1. The head of DISTAFF will supervise the implementation of the list of events and is responsible for keeping the exercise on track. After the exercise, the Head of DISTAFF will send the lessons identified to the head of the Evaluation Team and to the EADRCC, not later than 15 December 2021.
- 2.3.2. The DISTAFF members will support the Head of DISTAFF in controlling the exercise by providing feedback and keeping the play within the limits established by the scenario.
- 2.3.3. The DISTAFF members deployed at sites are expected to work under any weather condition. They will:
  - ☑ report in person to the DISTAFF HQ each day before deploying to the assigned exercise site (physical or virtual);
  - ☑ report to DISTAFF HQ via assigned communication:
  - ☑ once arrived and upon departure from the exercise site (physical or virtual);
  - ☑ any activity that may hinder the execution of the exercise; and
  - ☑ report in person to the DISTAFF HQ each day after the field exercise.
- 2.3.4. DISTAFF members will be assigned to sites (physical and virtual) according to their expertise (they should not expect to observe their national teams).

#### 3. Evaluation Team

- 3.1. **Objective**: The objective of the Evaluation Team is to provide an independent evaluation of the activities and the procedures linked to the exercise objectives, and make recommendations for their improvement.
- 3.2. **Composition of the Evaluation Team:** The team will be composed of a head of Evaluation, deputies and team members with responsibilities detailed in the list of positions ("List of positions within the Evaluation Team" on page 2.69).

#### 3.3. Roles and responsibilities:

- 3.3.1. During the exercise, from 20 to 23 September 2021, the evaluators will evaluate the activities in the North Macedonia Local Emergency Management Authority, the OSOCC, UCC, EMTCC and JDOCC. They will also monitor and evaluate the activities of the various national teams of the EADRU, civil-military cooperation, and coordination between the LEMA and participating national disaster relief and rescue teams.
- 3.3.2. After the exercise, the evaluators will prepare a Final Evaluation Report. This report shall be forwarded to the EADRCC, not later than 15 December 2021.
- 3.3.3. In order to provide an independent evaluation, evaluators will have access to all the information and activities.

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#### **HOST NATION SUPPORT**

#### 1. General

- 1.1. The Republic of North Macedonia will provide comprehensive support for participants in the exercise "NORTH MACEDONIA 2021" concerning visas, border crossings, customs control, transport, medical services, security, telecommunications, accommodation and food.
- 1.2. To allow for a timely and proper preparation of the host nation support arrangements, it is extremely important that participating international teams provide the Ministry of Interior of the Republic of North Macedonia with all relevant information described below in this Annex. All participating teams are requested to send the required information to the organisers in a timely manner by utilising the appropriate forms and on-line registration forms, which will be send by EADRCC, or can be downloaded from the EADRCC web-site (www.nato.int/eadrcc) or the exercise web-platform (eadrcc.cmdrcoe.org).
- 1.3. In order to facilitate the successful preparation of the Host Nation Support and for ease of reference, a

#### 2. Visa support

- It is of particular importance for participants who will need a visa to enter North Macedonia to indicate 2.1. this on their registration forms. The Ministry of Interior of the Republic of North Macedonia, in coordination with the Ministry of Foreign Affairs of the Republic of North Macedonia, will make the necessary arrangements to facilitate the issuance of visas.
- 2.2. Countries that need a visa for the Republic of North Macedonia are listed at https://mfa.gov.mk/page/31/ do-you-need-a-visa (see also paragraph 1 on page 3.9).
- 2.3. Additional visa requirements may apply for transit countries.
- 24 Additional information about the procedure to obtain a visa at the Embassies of the Republic of North Macedonia, permanent representations, diplomatic missions, consulates and consulates general abroad can be found at: https://mfa.gov.mk/page/12/foreign-citizens.
- 2.5. Visa applications must be submitted to the Crisis Management Center of North Macedonia and relevant ministries, not later than 31 July 2021 to allow for proper vetting.
- 2.6. The following procedure must be followed to obtain a visa:

- 2.6.2. The EADRCC will validate the participants and issue a Visa Invitation Letter to the authorities of the Republic of North Macedonia.
- 2.6.3. The authorities of North Macedonia will vet the visa request and reply accordingly.

#### 3. Points of Entry

- 3.1. Participants arriving by road / railroad are requested to use the official Border Crossing Points (NOTE: all vehicles will be marked with the official exercise logo):

- 3.3. Participating teams will be escorted from the border crossing point to the Base of Operations. Teams will be met and escorted by civilian police.
- 3.4. Participants arriving by air are strongly encouraged to use "Ohrid Airport". They will be welcomed at a "welcome desk" by North Macedonia and escorted to the Base of Operations or hotel.
- 3.5. Participants who wish to use Skopje International Airport" will also be welcomed by at a "welcome desk", manned by North Macedonia. These participants, however, may need to wait at the airport to pool for transport. The waiting time can be several hours.
- 3.6. A Reception Departure Centre will be established to facilitate the arrival and subsequent departure of international response teams <u>near</u> the Base of Operations.

#### 4. Customs controls

- 4.1. Participants have to follow the customs regulations of the Republic of North Macedonia.
- 4.2. National teams participating in the Field Training Exercise will have to fill in the EADRU form provided by EADRCC. The form should be signed, stamped, scanned and submitted to the Ministry of Interior of the Republic of North Macedonia for customs declaration and clearance **not later than 13 August 2021** (particular attention should be given to the list of personnel, medical vehicles and major equipment). It should be sent to the following email addresses: daniel.gorgievski@cuk.gov.mk
- 4.3. National teams must bring three signed and stamped copies of the EADRU form to North Macedonia. On their arrival at the border crossing point, the first copy will be given to the customs authorities of the Republic of North Macedonia. On their return journey, national teams will show the second copy to the customs authorities of the Republic of North Macedonia to be compared with the first copy. The items consumed during the exercise will be justified by a document issued by the Customs Service or the Crisis Management Center of North Macedonia, upon request.



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4.4. A representative of the Customs Service and the Crisis Management Center of the Republic of North Macedonia will meet all incoming teams at the border crossing points to facilitate crossing and escort them to the Base of Operations. North Macedonia underlined that Oslo Guidelines will be used as the legal basis for respective activities.

- 4.5. Military personnel participating in this exercise will <u>not</u> carry arms.
- 4.6. Vehicles transiting and entering North Macedonia must have a valid liability insurance (green card) or a comparable document confirming owner's liability for any damages.
- 4.7. North Macedonia its customs regulations place strict limits on the amount of cash and/or precious metals that may be brought in or taken out of North Macedonia by an individual. In general, individuals may bring in or take out of North Macedonia the equivalent of up to 10 000 EUR (at the official exchange rate) without a written customs declaration. Amounts exceeding 10 000 EUR must be declared.

#### 5. Transportation within the territory of the Republic of North Macedonia

- 5.1. Participating Teams are responsible for their own transportation to and from the exercise areas. Authorities of North Macedonia will provide support upon request.
- 5.2. Teams transiting through other nations may be exempt from road tolls upon request. Please provide your itinerary to the EADRCC, by 13 August 2021. The Centre will try to facilitate your transit within the respective nations.
- 5.3. The Crisis Management Center of the Republic of North Macedonia, in cooperation with the Office for General and Common Works, will organise transport for TTX participants, DISTAFF, Evaluators, observers and VIPs.

#### 6. Accommodation

- 6.1. The Balkan Medical Task Force will be positioned at the Base of Operations in Ohrid. They are self-sufficient.
- 6.2. Field Training Exercise and Table Top Exercise participants are encouraged to accommodate in hotels. Separate hotels will be foreseen, as to assure the COVID-19 bubbles.
- 6.3. Toilets and shower / wash facilities will be provided separately for male and female participants at a ratio of approximately 20 persons per toilet / shower / wash basin. The ratio between male and female facilities will be determined in accordance with actual participation based on registration forms.
- 6.4. Field Training Exercise teams should stay in their own tents. Participating teams should also bring all necessary equipment, including heaters (electric and gas heaters allowed), for their accommodation. For Field Training Exercise participants, and upon explicit prior request, North Macedonia will provide a limited number of tents and beds (mattresses, pillows, blankets and bed sheets included) free of charge.
- 6.5. Vehicles and team equipment can be securely stored at the Base of Operations. The premises are guarded 24/7 by the police force.

- 6.8.2. Reservations can be cancelled or modified without penalty until [tbc]. In case of non-arrival or late cancellation, cancellation fees of 100% of the above mentioned room rate will be charged per night for the duration of stay scheduled. The general terms and conditions of the hotel apply.
- 6.11. Transportation to and from the hotel to the exercise area will be provided by the Republic of North Macedonia.

#### 7. Meals

- 7.1. The **[tbc]**, further referred as catering service of North Macedonia, will provide catering for participating teams at their own expense: the costs of three daily meals will be approximately **15** Euros per day per person (**5** Euros per meal). Three cooked meals, or a dry daily meal (lunch package) for the field exercise day, will be provided per day. **No pork meat will be served**.
- 7.2. Field Training Exercise participants must indicate in the EADRU form for national teams and in the online registration form for exercise staff, their intention to buy meals from the catering service of North Macedonia at the Base of Operations. The meal tickets will be prepared by the catering service of North Macedonia upon information provided by participants.
- 7.3. National teams can buy the meal tickets for the whole week at the Base of Operations on Sunday 19 September. Exercise staff can buy the meal tickets for the whole week at the Base of Operations on Monday morning 20 September. All meals have to be paid in cash in **Euro/Macedonian Denar**.
- 7.4. Three litres of bottled drinking water per day will be distributed to each participant free of charge. The distribution will take place each morning.



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#### **Payment** 8.

At the Base of Operations, all payments can only be made in cash (Macedonian Denar only). Money 8.1. exchange services as well as cash machines (ATM) are available in Ohrid, as well as in the municipality of Struga.

#### 9. Fuel

9.1. Fuel for participating teams will be available at gas stations in the vicinity of the Base of Operations at their own expense.

#### 10. Compressed air

10.1. Compressed air (available pressure tbc)will be provided by North Macedonia upon request at the Base of Operations.

#### 11. Medical

- 11.1. The host nation will provide emergency medical services and dental support to all participants. At the Base of Operations, a medical post will be established in the Table Top Exercise building, groud floor ("First-aid post." on page 2.30), and free emergency services will be provided as necessary. Additionally, ambulances with a doctor and a nurse will be assigned to all exercise sites.
- 11.2. All participating teams will receive detailed briefings about the medical plan and procedures upon arrival.
- 11.3. All participants are encouraged to have their own international health insurance.

#### 12. **Veterinary requirements**

- 12.1. The following veterinary requirements for the temporary import of search dogs to North Macedonia apply:
- All dogs should have either EU passports or CIS certificates together with a proof of a valid vaccination 12.2. against rabies (serum test which is at least 3 months old and valid for 24 months). All dogs should have either chips or tattoos with a number. All documents should be translated into English. No animal food restrictions apply, but the food must be transported in its original package.

#### 13. Language requirements and Interpretation

The working language of the exercise is English. NATO and/or the Republic of North Macedonia will 13.1. provide English-Russian interpretation as well as English/Macedonian interpretation. Sufficient interpretation capabilities will be available at the exercise sites.

#### 14. Maps

The host nation will provide all teams with necessary maps upon arrival. 14.1.

#### 15. Storage

15.1. The host nation will prepare storage areas in facilities at the Base of Operations.



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#### 16. Safety and Security

- 16.1. All participants regardless of their mode of travel (plane, train, or vehicle) will be met at the state border by a representatives of the Crisis Management Center, the Ministry of Interior and the Customs Service of the Republic of North Macedonia. The police will be responsible for the security and protection of exercise participants.
- 16.2. The Base of Operations will be guarded on a 24/7 basis.
- 16.3. North Macedonia will provide dedicated safety and security advisers (from Police and other competent authorities) to the On-site Commanders at each exercise site.
- 16.4. All participating teams will receive detailed briefings about the safety and security plan and procedures upon arrival. All exercise participants will be provided with name tags that should be worn visibly at all times.

#### 17. COVID-19

- 17.1. All the exercise participants, exercise staff and VIPs entering the territory of the Republic of North Macedonia must present proof of full vaccination or a negative PCR test (polymerase chain reaction test) taken less than 72h prior to arrival in the nation.
- 17.2. All persons participating in the exercise shall undergo an AntiGen test, free of charge:
  - 17.2.1. Persons arriving through Ohrid St. Paul the Apostle Airport at the Welcome Desk of the exercise in the airport;
  - 17.2.2. Persons arriving through Skopje International Airport at the Welcome Desk of the exercise in the airport; and
  - 17.2.3. Persons arriving by land crossing points at the Welcome Desk in the Base of Operations, and prior to any contact with other teams or participants.
- 17.3. Upon a positive AntiGen test, a PCR test will be taken and the local epidemiologist will decide upon quarantine restrictions (10 or 14 days). Any costs incurred by quarantine will be at the participant's own expense (no possibility to claim reimbursement from North Macedonia or NATO).

#### 18. Other

- 18.1. During the opening and closing ceremonies, national flags of participating nations to be displayed on the stage and country name tags will be provided for the line-up of the teams by the host nation and NATO. Other flags are not allowed.

- 2.3. Third-country nationals with **permanent residence** in an EU Member State or a country signatory of the Schengen Agreement may stay no longer than 15 (fifteen) days upon every entry into the territory of the Republic of North Macedonia as long as the total length of stay does not exceed 90 days in any 180-day period.
- 2.4. Third-country nationals with **multiple-entry Schengen visa (type C)** valid for at least 5 (five) days beyond the intended stay in the Republic of North Macedonia may stay no longer than 15 (fifteen) days upon every entry into the territory of the Republic of North Macedonia as long as the total length of stay does not exceed 90 days in any 180-day period.
- 2.5. Third-country nationals with a **British, Canadian or U.S. visa** valid for at least 5 (five) days beyond the intended stay in the Republic of Macedonia, may stay in the Republic of Macedonia no longer than 15 (fifteen) days upon every entry into the territory of the Republic of North Macedonia as long as the total length of subsequent stays in the Republic of Macedonia does not exceed 3 (three) months in any six-month period, from the date of first entry.
- Note: Additional visa requirements may also apply for transit countries.

#### **EXERCISE "NORTH MACEDONIA 2021"**

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#### **COVID-19 COUNTER-MEASURES**

#### 1. Arrival

- 1.1. All the exercise participants, exercise staff and VIPs entering the territory of the Republic of North Macedonia must present proof of full vaccination or a negative PCR test (polymerase chain reaction test) taken less than 72h prior to arrival in the nation.
- 1.2. All persons participating in the exercise shall undergo an AntiGen test, free of charge:
  - 1.2.1. Persons arriving through Ohrid St. Paul the Apostle Airport at the Welcome Desk of the exercise in the airport;
  - 1.2.2. Persons arriving through Skopje International Airport at the Welcome Desk of the exercise in the airport; and
  - 1.2.3. Persons arriving by land crossing points at the Welcome Desk in the Base of Operations, and prior to any contact with other teams or participants.
- 1.3. Upon a positive AntiGen test, a PCR test will be taken and the local epidemiologist will decide upon quarantine restrictions (10 or 14 days).

#### 2. COVID-19 Safety Officer

2.1. The Republic of North Macedonia will appoint a COVID-19 safety officer, who will oversee all the activities of the exercise and provide guidance to participants with regards to social distancing, face masks, and other rules in vigour.

#### 3. Exercise bubbles

- 3.1. Exercise participants will be divided into 6 COVID-19 bubbles, as to safeguard the health of every individual participating in the exercise:
  - 3.1.1. Table-top exercise participants, including OSOCC, UCC, EMTCC, JDOCC, LEMA and PIC.
  - 3.1.2. Field training exercise participants
  - 3.1.3. Balkan Medical Task Force and their role players;
  - 3.1.4. VIP Symposium participants
  - 3.1.5. Media
  - 3.1.6. Exercise management
- 3.2. The bubbles will be accommodated in different hotels, as to minimize the physical interaction between them.
