## Welcome to the CMDR COE's Annual Booklet 2022 - 2023!

In this issue, we look back at year past, outline our future priorities and present ongoing and upcoming initiatives. We set our ambition high for 2023 in line with our intent to continuously increase the CMDR COE's added value to transformative advancement in crisis and disaster management. We stress on our research and analysis and the

goal of identifying interdisciplinary linkages and establishing cross-institutional synergies. We exemplify how we transform the latter into targeted contributions to concept and doctrine development, lessons-learned, and into tailored E&T products for senior military and civilian staff.

A key priority in 2022 was the gradual re-introduction of resident events in an improved physical and technical environment. We will continue to offer the option for hybrid participation in selected events or to deliver these entirely online. Our goal is to allow for diverse and wide participation from across NATO, its member and partner nations, to minimise travel and related environmental footprint, and save time and resources while maintaining high standards of quality.

Our capacity to act as a catalyst for transformation in the crisis and disaster management domain is closely contingent upon the ability to forge fruitful partnerships. Therefore, cooperation rests at the heart of the Centre and underpins the realisation of our strategic objectives. We seek to build a common ground for collaboration and exchange with relevant stakeholders. For instance, the Centre has since 2018 been involved in capacity building for the Jordanian National Centre for Security and Crisis Management (NCSCM). This project, part of NATO's Defence Capacity Building (DCB) Trust Fund initiative, has been developed and coordinated by the NATO International Staff. The CMDR COE also continuously strengthens its fruitful collaboration with the European Security and Defence College (ESDC) and with the EU Military Training Group (EUMTG) particularly in its capacity as a Department Head (DH) for the discipline on "Military Contribution to EU Disaster Response (DR), Humanitarian Assistance (HA) and Civil Protection (CP)". We have successfully developed and piloted two courses and conducted a Training Requirements Assessment for the aforementioned discipline. Currently, the CMDR COE is supporting the development of a project on civil-military cooperation in climate-related emergencies and will continue to foster and expand its partnership network including within the framework of a reinvigorated Community of Interest (CoI) on crisis and disaster management.

We **revamped the concept for our CoI** further emphasizing exchange of knowledge and good practices, result-oriented engagement in projects and initiatives, and continuous expansion. We initiated the development of **an entirely new platform** to better meet the needs of that extended collaboration in an improved virtual environment.

We keep up developing our knowledge base and expertise on resilience, gender mainstreaming, human security, protection of civilians, civil preparedness, building integrity and climate



change - our aim being contributing meaningfully to a 360-degree approach to security. For instance, our research on climate change **implications on military activities**, **including such related to humanitarian assistance and disaster relief**, examines the triple nexus of climate change, security and gender. We advocate for the systematic integration of **gender perspectives** in the study and practice of planning and decision-making. We further explore **resilience** and particularly **societal resilience** as a critical component in the process of preventing crises and emergencies including such

precipitated by climate change and environmental degradation.

The CMDR COE keeps enriching its thematic scope to reflect as well as to anticipate developments in the security environment. We are currently following developments in and seeking avenues for productive cooperation on cultural property protection, consequence management, and emerging technologies, particularly artificial intelligence.

Retaining a capacity to anticipate the intricate interplay of political, social, technological, economic and environmental challenges necessitates efficient allocation and utilisation of resources, especially within a growing level of ambition. We utilise Business analysis models to help us deliver on our objectives. Furthermore, we leverage our modelling and simulation capabilities to improve our products and projects. The Centre's Operational Laboratory (OpsLab) has substantially contributed to various research initiatives and to the improvement of training materials, particularly scenarios.

To anticipate the future requires preparing for tomorrow's challenges today. Doing so invariably involves tapping into the vast potential young people carry by providing them with opportunities for personal and professional advancement while benefiting from their skills and competences. The **CMDR COE's Internship Programme** allows us to cooperate with the brightest of minds and the most skilful and motivated of young professionals determined to be part of a team transforming challenges to collective security into opportunities for a more inclusive and safer future. We have been systematically improving our **paid** Internship Programme convinced that the transfer of knowledge between and among generations is critical to prosperity and progress.

The year past is, as I am confident - the year ahead will continue to be a true example of professionalism and dedication to cementing the CMDR COE's position as a front-runner in the crisis and disaster management domain, and as a stakeholder in critical transversal topics. Excellence more than a mission for us - it is a firm conviction in the benefits of hard work and constructive cooperation, and we spare no effort on the way forward. Our strides become ever more confident as our team grows - we were delighted to welcome consecutively two new Sponsoring nations - Romania and Hungary, and we look forward to continuing this process of enlargement and to further contributing to inclusive transformation.

Centres of Excellence (COEs) are nationally or multi-nationally funded institutions that train and educate leaders and specialists from NATO member and partner countries, assist in doctrine development, identify lessons learned, improve interoperability, and capabilities and test and validate concepts through experimentation. They offer recognized expertise and experience that is of benefit to the Alliance and support the transformation of NATO, while avoiding the duplication of assets, resources and capabilities already present within the NATO command structure.

Coordinated by Allied Command Transformation (ACT) in Norfolk, Virginia (USA), COEs are considered to be international military organizations. Although not part of the NATO command structure, they are part of a wider framework supporting NATO Command Arrangements. The ACT has overall responsibility for COEs and is in charge of the establishment, accreditation, preparation of candidates for approval, and periodic assessments of the centres. Designed to complement the Alliance's current resources, COEs cover a wide variety of areas, with each one focusing on a specific field of expertise to enhance NATO capabilities.



#### **BACKGROUND**

COEs trace their roots back to the reorganisation of NATO's military command structure following the Prague Summit in 2002. After the summit, Allied Command Atlantic became Allied Command Transformation (ACT). ACT became responsible for transforming the Alliance into a leaner, more efficient organisation.

Specifically, ACT ensures that the Alliance is able to face future challenges by enhancing training, conducting experiments to test new concepts and promoting interoperability within the Alliance. In line with this goal, ACT has used its links with various institutions to direct the transformation of the military structure, forces, capabilities and doctrine of the Alliance.

#### **ROLE OF COEs**

COEs generally specialise in one functional area and act as subject-matter experts in their field. They distribute their in-depth knowledge through training, conferences, seminars, concepts, doctrine, lessons learned and papers.

In addition to giving NATO and partner country leaders and units the opportunity to augment their education and training, COEs also help the Alliance to expand interoperability, increase capabilities, aid in the development of doctrine and standards, conduct analyses, evaluate lessons learned and experiment in order to test and verify concepts.


COEs work alongside the Alliance even though NATO does not directly fund them and they are not part of the NATO command structure. They are nationally or multi-nationally funded and are part of a supporting network, encouraging internal and external information exchange to the benefit of the Alliance. The overall responsibility for COE coordination and utilisation within NATO lies with Allied Command Transformation (ACT), in coordination with the Supreme Allied Commander Europe (SACEUR).

#### **COEs MECHANISM**

There are three different types of participants for COEs: "Framework Nations", "Sponsoring Nations" and "Contributing Nations". Generally, a Framework Nation agrees to take on the responsibility of developing the concept and implementation of the COE. In addition, it agrees to provide physical space for the operation of the COE, as well as personnel to run the institution. Sponsoring Nations contribute financially to the COE and also provide personnel, whose salary they cover. Contributing Nations may provide financial support or some other service that is of use to the functioning of the COE.

All COEs must act as a catalyst for NATO transformation and open activities to all Alliance members. COEs must not duplicate nor compete with current NATO capabilities, but instead offer an area of expertise not already found within NATO. To this end, all COEs must have subject-matter experts in their field of specialisation. ACT periodically re-assesses COEs in order to ensure that they continue to meet those criteria and assure continued NATO accreditation status. Ultimately, the Military Committee and the North Atlantic Council must approve the initial accreditation of the COE.





#### **MISSION**

As enshrined in the CMDR COE Concept (2016), the mission of the CMDR COE is to act as a catalyst for the enhancement of NATO, NATO Nations' and Partners' capabilities in crisis management and disaster response operations through collaborative partnerships.

To accomplish the Centre's mission we provide subject-matter expertise and advice on crisis management and disaster response, and contribute to doctrine development and to concept development and experimentation. The education and training opportunities we provide, including through mobile training teams, encompass both civilian and military experts from senior military and civilian leadership to staff level, as well as units and teams.

In close cooperation with the Joint Analysis and Lessons Learned Centre (JALLC) the CMDR COE serves as a repository for International, National and NATO shared information, analysis and lessons-learned on crisis management and disaster response.

#### **MAIN EVENTS SEPTEMBER-DECEMBER 2021**

## A course in Jordan for planning crisis response operations



From 25 to 30 September 2021, the National Center for Security and Crisis Management (NCSCM) in Amman, Jordan, hosted the fourth consecutive training event delivered by a mobile training team from CMDR COE. A course in "Strategic Planning for Crisis Response Operations" was conducted as part of the NATO Defense Capability Building Project for Jordan. The topic of the course provided the trainees with theoretical knowledge and practical training regarding the decision-making process within the NATO crisis response planning at a strategic level. The training audience consisted of representatives from NCSCM and several Jordanian agencies and ministries. The course placed emphasis on the main processes related to the strategic assessment, political-military estimation, response options and course of action development. As an integral part of the NATO Defense Capability Building Project for Jordan, this event succeeded in enhancing the professional skills and knowledge of the trainees as well as in strengthening NCSCM's capacity with regard to the

aforementioned area.

At the closing ceremony, the Vice Chairman of NCSCM, Brigadier General Hatem Alzoubi, and the Bulgarian Military Attachň, COL Stoyan Uzunov, congratulated the participants and CMDR COE's team for the successful completion of this cooperative event. Alongside his gratitude to CMDR COE's team for the support provided to the capability development process, Brigadier Alzoubi expressed his desire for continuing this fruitful cooperation in the future.

## **Expanding the GFP Network**

The third iteration of the Gender Focal Point (GFP) course took place online in October 2021. The event provided a platform for constructive exchange of knowledge and experience among a group of 20 learners from the NATO International Military Staff (IMS), other NATO entities, and NATO members' Ministries of Defence.

The GFP course enables personnel successfully to perform the support in the integration of gender perspectives within their functional area and respective chain of command. A balanced mixture of live interactive lectures and individual and collective exercises facilitated deliberations on existing policy framework and tools for gender mainstreaming, and on the role of GFPs within NATO's gender advisory structure.

## A hybrid edition of CRO planners professional development



The first hybrid iteration of the Crisis Response Operation Planners Professional Development Course took place from 4 to 8 October 2021 through the CMDR COE Virtual Studio.

The interest to this course has continued to grow and representatives from different civil and military structures and institutions from Bulgaria, Greece, Jordan and Poland attended this particular iteration. The course participants appreciated highly the lectures given by experienced instructors, including LtC Dempsey from SHAPE/J5 and Assoc. Prof. Mila Serafimova, who shared their experience and expertise with the training audience, thus broadening the participants' knowledge about the course topic.

#### First Academic Advisory Board (AAB) Meeting



The Crisis Management and Disaster Response Centre of Excellence (CMDR COE) organised and hosted the 1st Academic Advisory Board (AAB) Meeting, which took place on 19 October 2021 on CMDR COE premises in Sofia, Bulgaria. The list of members of the AAB includes Prof. Dr. Sc. Eng. Mitko Stoykov and Assoc. Prof. Dr. Nina Dobrinkova representing the Republic of Bulgaria, Colonel Dariusz Majchrzak representing the Republic of Poland, and Quaestor Stefan Savulescu representing Romania. Additionally, Assoc. Prof. Dr. Vasileios Syros, CDR Royal UK Navy John Gray from the ACT HQ, Colonel Attila Ferenc Varga and Major Göbor Erki from Hungary, and Mr. Toni Petreski from the Republic of North Macedonia took part in the event as observers.

After adopting the CMDR COE AAB Terms of Reference, the Academic Advisory Board members appointed Prof. Dr. Sc. End. Mitko Stoykov as Chairperson. A key

point of the event was that a mutual agreement was reached among the AAB members, concerning the specific events from the CMDR COE POW, which shall be subject to monitoring and evaluation from the AAB. This marks the beginning of a fruitful and promising collaboration between CMDR COE and multiple academic and governmental institutions.

## **CMDR COE Steering Committee**



The 9th CMDR COE Steering Committee (SC) meeting was held from 20 to 21 October 2021 on the CMDR COE premises in Sofia, Bulgaria. The event was opened by the Chairman of the CMDR COE Steering Committee (SC), Lieutenant General Dimitar Iliev, Deputy Chief of Defence of the Republic of Bulgaria. In his opening remarks, Lieutenant General Iliev welcomed the representative from the Framework Nation, the Republic of Bulgaria, as well as the representatives from the Sponsoring Nations, namely the Hellenic Republic, the Republic of Poland, and Romania, to the meeting. Lieutenant General Iliev highlighted the great success of the fruitful collaboration between the Framework and Sponsoring Nations of CMDR COE. Furthermore, the Chairman of the SC congratulated CMDR COE for maintaining the high-quality standards of its products and conducted activities, and for successfully

adapting to the novel challenges, posed by the current global pandemic.

Alongside SC members, who represented the Framework and the Sponsoring Nations, a representative from NATO's Allied Command Transformation (ACT) was present at the event as an advisor, while representatives from Hungary, the Republic of Poland, and the Republic of North Macedonia took part as observers. As such, they were given the opportunity to familiarise themselves with the activities and projects carried out by CMDR COE, as well as to actively engage in discussions about current trends in the crisis management and disaster response domain. Moreover, proposals concerning the collective responsibility of the Framework and Sponsoring Nations were discussed in order to further enhance the quality of services provided by CMDR COE.

During the meeting, the SC members approved the CMDR COE Budget for 2022 and the Programme of Work (POW) 2022.

#### The course for exercise planners training

The first hybrid iteration of the Crisis Management and Disaster Response Exercise Planners Training Course took place from 18 to 22 October 2021. It was conducted through the CMDR COE Virtual Studio and succeeded in broadening the participants' knowledge on the planning and management of exercises in the CMDR domain.

During the closing ceremony, the CMDR COE Director placed emphasis on the uniqueness of this event, which integrates the knowledge from NATO Exercise Planning, Crisis Management and Disaster Response domains. Additionally, the coursed brings together participants from a variety of countries (Azerbaijan, Jordan, Portugal, Greece and Bulgaria) as well as from multiple organisations - Greek Army, NFIU Poland, Portuguese Joint Operations Center, Jordanian National Center for Security and Crisis Management, Bulgarian Ministry of Interior, Bulgarian Ministry of Foreign Affairs, Bulgarian Ministry of Defense, Bulgarian Navy HQ, Bulgarian Military Police, Bulgarian Land Forces HQ, Bulgarian National Military University and Bulgarian Air Force Academy.

#### Resilience through Civil Preparedness Course



From 2 to 4 November 2021 the Crisis Management and Disaster Response Centre of Excellence (CMDR COE), in collaboration with the CIMIC Centre of Excellence (CCOE), conducted an online iteration of the Resilience through Civil Preparedness Course. Representatives of different civil and military structures and institutions from Albania, Bulgaria, Greece, Hungary and the USA attended the event.

Through the joint efforts on behalf of CMDR COE, CCOE and NATO's Department Head for CIMIC/CMI/Civil Preparedness discipline, the event was successfully developed piloted in December 2019.

The course provides senior civilian and military experts with an understanding of the various aspects of resilience at the state strategic level and the effects, thereafter, on the operational level, with a focus on the connection between civil preparedness and improved operational effectiveness.

This iteration welcomed several inspiring instructors from the Hague University, NATO International Staff, SHAPE / J9, the European External Action Service, Allied Command Transformation and CIMIC COE, who provided valuable insights into the Resilience through Civil Preparedness area.

## CMDR COE in support of a high-level training



The Jordanian National Level Exercise Darb Al-Aman 2021 took place in Amman, Hashemite Kingdom of Jordan from 7 to 11 November 2021. The aim of this important training event was to enhance the Jordanian National-Level Crisis Management Capability by strengthening the response and planning capacity in face of a national-level crisis such as a terrorist attack, environmental pollution and severe weather conditions. The training audience included essential Jordanian Leadership, the Jordanian National Centre for Security and Crisis Management (NCSCM), Relevant National government and Non-government agencies (NGA) and partners (39 ministries and agencies in total).

As an important part of the DCB TF project for Jordan, the CMDR COE dispatched a team of experts, led by Centre's Director, to participate in the execution phase of the exercise. The CMDR COE observed the exercise with the aim to provide external, independent and objective feedback about the conduct of Darb Al-Aman 2021. The CMDR COE expertise was focused mostly in the areas of the exercise evaluation, analysis and organisation of the Lessons Learned process, as well as the use of the IT technologies for organisation, conduct and management of the exercise. Nevertheless, the observation team was also able to gather valuable observations in other areas, such as: Real Life Support and exercise administration; exercise design and exercise documents; the execution of the exercise, including the Communications, Information and Knowledge Management, set up the Operational Centre, exercise Battle Rhythm, MEL/MIL, etc. As a result of its observations, the CMDR COE will submit to the NCSCM leadership a First Impression Report about the execution phase of the exercise with conclusions and recommendations for improvements.

## Online international conference addressing global challenges



An international conference on NATO's response to global challenges and, in particular, to climate change took place on 17 November 2021 in hybrid mode - at the CMDR COE premises and virtually through WebEx platform and YouTube. The conference was co-organised by Sofia Security Forum and CMDR COE, with the kind sponsorship of NATO Public Diplomacy Division.

This event provided a forum for discussions about the need of prompt and decisive response to climate change on behalf of NATO and Allied Nations. As climate change is considered a threat multiplier that affects Allied security, both in the Euro-Atlantic area and in the Alliance's broader range, NATO needs to increase its awareness and develop effective adaptation and mitigation measures with regard to this challenge. In addition, credible deterrence and defence posture needs to be ensured, by placing emphasis on the safety of

#### NATO military personnel.

Distinguished briefers and panelists took an active part in the event, including the current NATO Deputy Assistant Secretary General for Emerging Security Challenges - Mr. James Appathurai, one of his predecessors - Mr. Jamie Shea, the Deputy Director General of the European Union Military Staff (EUMS) - Lt. Gen. Giovanni Manione, the Head of the United Nations Liaison Office for Peace and Security (UNLOPS) - Mr. Rory Keane, and other civilian and military executives alongside climate and security experts, representatives from non-governmental organizations, think-tanks and the academia.

#### A course for decision-makers

CMDR COE successfully conducted a 5-day Strategic Decision Making for Crisis Response Operations course. From 22 to 26 November 2021 it provided general knowledge related to the strategic level of taking decisions, as well as the main players and mechanisms in crisis response operations from NATO and national perspective.

The attendees were introduced to numerous topics related to crisis management, capability development, gender perspectives, strategic communications and the leadership psychology in crisis response through lectures, practical teamwork and subsequent student presentations. Participants from Bulgarian Ministry of Defense, Bulgarian Air Force, Bulgarian Red Cross, Hellenic Ministry of National Defence, Hellenic

Army General Staff, Hungarian Ministry of Defense, Ukrainian State Emergency Service and the General Staff of the Armed Forces of Ukraine took part actively.

In addition, CMDR COE expresses special appreciation and gratitude to the guest-lecturers from the Bulgarian Ministry of Defense and the National Defense College.

#### Important visit



A delegation from the Republic of North Macedonia paid an official visit to CMDR COE from 6 to 8 December 2021. During discussions, the delegation from the North Macedonian Ministry of Defence presented its perspective on the possible future collaboration with CMDR COE. Additionally, the delegation members took part in an international conference, jointly organised by CMDR COE and Sofia Security Forum, on "The future of transatlantic relations: Turning a new page on enhanced cooperation amid new security challenges". The visit concluded with a discussion about the possibilities for future joint projects on a bilateral basis, and for future accession of the Republic of North Macedonia as a Sponsoring Nation to CMDR COE.

#### Future of Transatlantic Relations Conference



An international conference on topic "The Future of Transatlantic Relations: Turning a New Page on Enhanced Cooperation amid New Security Challenges" was held on 7 December 2021 in hybrid mode and live-streamed on the official CMDR COE YouTube channel. The event was co-organised by Sofia Security Forum, Konrad Adenauer Foundation and CMDR COE.

It succeeded in providing a forum for discussions about potential strategies for addressing and dealing with the most pressing security challenges at present in the context of the reinvigorated transatlantic partnership. In that regard, the possible pathways for development of the relationship between the European

Union and the US Administration were also analised in detail on behalf of the participating experts and practitioners in the respective field.

Participants from the audience had the privilege to exchange views and ask questions to distinguished briefers and panelists, such as Ambassador Todor Churov - the former Deputy Minister of Foreign Affairs of Bulgaria, Sedat Önal - Deputy Minister of Foreign Affairs of Turkey, Dănuţ Sebastian Neculăescu - State Secretary of the Ministry of Foreign Affairs of Romania, and other representatives from non-governmental organisations, think-tanks and the academia.

#### Last GFP iteration for 2021

The Gender Focal Point (GFP) course took place online from 06 to 10 December 2021 and provided a platform for constructive exchange of knowledge and experience among a group of learners from the NATO command structure, and NATO Allied and Partner nations' armed forces. It served as a venue for active discussions on the link between gender, conflict and security, the significance of gender mainstreaming to operational effectiveness, and on the ways to integrate gender perspectives in planning and decision-making.

## **MAIN EVENTS JANUARY-SEPTEMBER 2022**



#### Commence the 2022 internship year



As usual, the CMDR COE announced again in the beginning of the year its Internship Programme. The Centre has the pleasure of providing the interns with an opportunity for further personal and professional advancement in an international environment. As part of the Programme, each intern works on a research project, related to CMDR COE's portfolio and field of expertise. Besides, they are engaged in the everyday activities in the Centre. Thus, the interns get an invaluable insight into the crisis management and disaster response domain, while actively contributing to the events, organised and held by the Centre.

Committed to broader efforts at fair treatment and adequate remuneration for young professionals at the beginning of their career paths the CMDR COE Internship Programme aims to provide motivated young people with the opportunity of joining the organisation, where they can find an international hub of expertise and education in the crisis management and disaster response domain.

## GFP Course first in 2022



The first course for the year 2022 took place from 21 to 24 February 2022. The iteration of the NATO-approved Gender Focal Point (GFP) course saw a diverse group of military and civilian experts at the strategic and operational levels actively engage with the role of GFPs in support of the integration of gender perspectives within various areas of responsibility.

Whether identifying and challenging gendered stereotypes producing harmful biases in relation to the rights, opportunities and responsibilities of women, men, girls, and boys, or critically analysing gender mainstreaming in the security and defence sector, GFPs exercised constructive dialogue in favour of gender equality. They practiced advocating for and supporting the implementation of NATO's commitments to

the Women, Peace and Security agenda and recognised the importance of the Alliance's gender advisory structure in facilitating collaborative exchange.

## Mobile Training Team in BALTDEFCOL



From 7 to 11 March 2022 the Baltic Defense College in Tartu, Estonia welcomed for the first time a Mobile Education and Training Team (METT) from CMDR COE. 3 experts in Crisis Management and one Modelling & Simulation specialist delivered a module training as part of the Joint Command and General Staff Course (JGCSC). The operational course, which brings together many different nations each year, places additional emphasis on the Allied Joint Operations across the full spectrum of operations.

The dean of the College, COL (ret) Dr. Zdzislaw Sliwa, expressed his gratitude to the Centre's team and his optimism with regard to future joint activities with CMDR COE. Additionally, the METT received an outstanding support on

behalf of AMB Shota Gvineria.

Since 1999, the Baltic Defense College serves as a Professional Military Education institution, which applies the latest educational principles and promotes international cooperation in the research on security and defense policies in order to meet the defence and security needs of Estonia, Latvia and Lithuania.

The Crisis Management course delivered by the CMDR COE's team welcomed 71 trainees as part of the BALTDEFCOL training program for the academic year 2021-2022. The interactive course was comprised of a theoretical part and a table top exercise, and succeeded in engaging the training audience in active discussions and exchange of expertise and best practices related to the main topic of the event.

#### Initiating JADL Platform



From 14 March 2022, CMDR COE implemented the online iteration of the Disaster Management Course using the Joint Advanced Distributed Learning (JADL) platform. The course aim is acquisition of basic knowledge related to disasters as phenomenon, the disaster management process and its close relation to the risk management process, as well as the main players and mechanisms in disaster response. The course includes various briefings covering the following topics: Disaster Fundamentals, Disaster Environment and Disaster Risk Management, Risk and Vulnerability Assessment, National Disaster Risk Reduction Planning, UN Role in Disaster Relief, EU Civil Protection Mechanism, NATO Civil Emergency Planning, Civil-Military Coordination in HA/DR, etc.

## A workshop of Project MSG-187



From 15 to 17 March 2022 the CMDR COE conducted the MSG-187 Space Weather Environmental Modelling Workshop. The Workshop was held as a hybrid event. Its main objective was to enable a discussion about the results, which have been achieved so far, and about the adjustments, which could be introduced. The technical team during the Workshop consisted of CMDR COE staff members from the Operations Laboratory together with OF-2 Gautier Nguyen - Direction Gūnūrale de l'Armement (DGA). The technical team provided a conceptual definition of the group task, by introducing two main directions and finding the linkage between them. Furthermore, the team succeeded in setting the framework for further development.

## Cooperation with the Department of Energy, USA

From 22 to 23 March 2022 Mr. Andrae Brooks and Mr. Robert Augdahl, Specialists from the Office of Nuclear Incident Policy and Cooperation (NIPC), presented the US DOE perspective for future cooperation with the CMDR COE. It was pointed out that their office focused on Building Partnership Capacity and this has been their approach towards NATO - filling voids/gaps related to insufficient expertise, enhancing cooperation, and aligning their strengths to support the Alliance, by providing specialized training. The CMDR COE Director presented the network of COEs alongside the concept, vision, principles and specifically the organization of the Crisis Management and Disaster Response Centre of Excellence. The discussion mainly focused on the perspectives for potential future cooperation and common projects and activities between both organizations. In this regard, a foundation on a new initiative, namely an International Crisis Response and Consequent Management Course for NATO Member and Partnership Countries was established. The aforementioned initiative shall provide an opportunity for incorporating the crisis response "chain of concern" into a course, which will demonstrate NATO's approach to natural disasters, accidents with CBRN material, media and NATO vs national responsibilities. The pilot course is expected to be launched in April-May 2023.

#### Consecutive successful CMDR course

The Crisis Management and Disaster Response Course took place from 21 to 25 March 2022 when welcomed representatives from civil and military institutions from Bulgaria, Georgia, Greece, Italy, Poland, Tunisia and USA. The course succeeded in enhancing the trainees' knowledge about and raising their awareness of NATO Crisis Response fundamentals, NATO Crisis Response System (NCRS), and its complementary elements - NATO Crisis Response Process (NCRP), and Civil Emergency Planning, according to NATO "baseline requirements".

The insightful lectures were delivered by inspiring instructors, such as Mr. Stefano Scaini from OSDIFE (Observatory on Security and CBRN Defense), Dr. Silke Ruhl from the NATO MILMED COE, Mr. Stefan Delchev from CEPC, Prof. Maciej Marszałek from the War Studies University in Poland, Mr. Teemu Tammikko from EEAS, LTC Dariusz Dobron from the Polish MoD and Mr. Peter Bonev from the European Commission.

#### Celebrating the anniversary



On 31 March 2022, CMDR COE celebrated its 7th Anniversary. On this occasion, the Centre was honored by the presence of Ambassadors and Defence Attachüs from Embassies accredited in the Republic of Bulgaria (Albania, Egypt, France, Georgia, Germany, Greece, Hungary, Morroco, the Netherlands, Poland, Romania, Spain, Turkey, the United Kindgom of Great Britain and Northern Ireland, and the United States of America), the Deputy Minister of Defence of the Republic of Bulgaria - Mr. Yordan Bozhilov, the Deputy Chief of Defence - Lieutenant General Dimitar Iliev, the Advisors of the President of the Republic of Bulgaria on Security and Defence - Mr. Iliya Milushev and Mr. Stefan Godzhevargov, the Member of the Parliament - Mr. Hristo Simeonov, among others.

The Deputy Minister of Defence of the Republic of Bulgaria congratulated the CMDR COE on its achievements, expressed gratitude to the Sponsoring Nations of

#### Contribution to the largest UN exercise



Team of experts from CMDR COE provided support to the Viking 2022 Computer Assisted Exercise held from 30 March to 7 April 2022. This year more than 3500 participants - civilian, military and police - took part in the multinational staff exercise, which aims to train them how to meet the challenges deriving from the current and future multi-dimensional crisis response and peace operations. The exercise, led by the Swedish Ministry of Defence, follows the objectives outlined in NATO's Partnership for Peace (PfP) programme.

The event took place on different sites in Brazil, Bulgaria, Finland, Qatar and Sweden. It is a training platform, which aims to prepare civilians, military personnel and police officers to participate in peace-promoting efforts.

As part of the world's largest UN peace operation exercise, the scenario covered the deployment of a UN peace-enforcement mission as well as the deployment of a NATO crisis response operation (Small Joint) in the fictitious country. A JTF HQ including CC level and 5 brigade HQs trained simultaneously on sites located in Bulgaria, Finland and Sweden.

## Hybrid iteration of the Climate Change and Security course

Another successful hybrid iteration of a course took place from 5 to 8 April 2022. The Climate Change and Security course was simultaneously broadcasted online and held in presence at Centre's premises in Sofia, and online. The course was conducted under the auspices of the European Security and Defence College (ESDC) and in collaboration with the Diplomatic Institute to the Ministry of Foreign Affairs of the Republic of Bulgaria. Essential topics related to global warming and its role as a threat multiplier, the impact of climate change on public health, international peace and security, and the necessity of an integrated approach to climate and security challenges were covered.

During the course, participants from Algeria, Austria, Bulgaria, Denmark, Germany, Greece, Portugal, Romania, Spain, Sweden, and the United States of America were actively engaged in thought-provoking discussions, by exchanging good practices and broadening their knowledge about the topic.

#### The JFCNP ACOS J9 Visit



On April 14, 2021, the Assistant Chief of Staff J9 (ACOS J9) of the Allied Joint Force Command Naples (JFCNP), Brigadier General Marcus Ellermann paid a visit to the Crisis Management and Disaster Response Centre of Excellence (CMDR COE). The distinguish visitor was briefed on the COEs network as well as on the mission, vision, principles organisation of CMDR COE. Additionally, the ongoing projects and the courses provided by the Centre were presented accordingly. This meeting provided a unique venue for exchange of ideas, by outlining possible paths for future cooperation and joint endeavours.

## Note of joining of Hungary to CMDR COE



The Note of Joining of Hungary to CMDR COE was signed at the Headquarters of the Allied Command of Transformation on April 25, 2022. The Ministry of Defence of Hungary has decided to broaden its participation in NATO's overall crisis management and disaster response efforts.

The Ministries of Defence of Bulgaria, Greece, Poland, and the Ministry of Internal Affairs of Romania welcomed the expressed commitment and welcomed the Ministry of Defence of Hungary as a Participant in CMDR COE.

## The 2022 COE Marketplace



The Command Group of CMDR COE participated in the 2022 COE Marketplace, held in Brussels, Belgium, from 9 to 11 May 2022. Colonel Nikolov, Captain Navy Tzavaras, Colonel Jurski and Colonel Milanov presented the work and activities of Centre to the NATO HQ authorities and shared best practices with other participants in this event.

The aim of 2022 COE Marketplace is to provide an opportunity for all staff and national personnel at NATO HQ to meet representatives from all 28 NATO-accredited Centres of Excellence (COEs) in order to recognise, understand and embrace the value of the expertise, support and advice provided by these NATO-affiliated organisations. The event has received full support on behalf

of NATO's leadership and represents an excellent opportunity for the COEs to promote their work by sharing their products and the outputs delivered by their Sponsoring Nations with regard to the common efforts of the Alliance.

## The role of crisis diplomacy



An online iteration of the Crisis Management in Multilateral Frameworks (IGOs): The Role of Political/Civilian and Military Crisis Diplomacy Course took place from 17 to 19 May 2022 through the CMDR COE Virtual Studio.

The event succeeded in providing insights into the Crisis Management fundamentals, with a focus on Political/Civilian and Military Diplomacy, alongside the respective policies, processes, tools and stakeholders.

The course welcomed several inspiring instructors, including Dr. Simona SOARE from the European Union Institute for Security Studies (EUISS), Prof. Vasilios Syros from the Medici Archive Project, Assoc. Prof. Doncho DOYCHEV from the Bulgarian Ministry of Defense, LTC Guran SWISTEK from the German Institute for International and Security Affairs.

Representatives from different civil and military structures and institutions from Bulgaria, Greece, Italy, Netherlands, Poland, Portugal and USA took part in the course, as well as the three interns from CMDR COE. They enhanced their knowledge about multilateral diplomacy, rebuilding post-conflict societies, EU-NATO cooperation in crisis management, key crisis management actors, the UN Crisis Diplomacy, and the military aspect of crisis diplomacy.

#### The second GFP course in 2022

The second NATO Gender Focal Point (GFP) course iteration for 2022 took place from 23 to 26 May and CMDR COE was pleased to welcome a group of newly certified GFPs to the wider NATO gender advisory network!

A balanced mixture of live interactive lectures and individual and collective exercises facilitated deliberations on existing policy framework and tools for gender mainstreaming, and on the role of GFPs within NATO's gender advisory structure.

This final day of the course saw senior military and civilian staff engage in a role play as part of their summative assessment - putting to the test the knowledge generated throughout the course and practicing support for the integration of gender perspectives.

CMDR COE and the entire course team should like to wish the GFPs best of success in their important role in supporting the advancement of the Women, Peace and Security agenda.

## Seminar on Crisis Response System



A seminar on topic "Crisis Response System" was conducted on May 27 May. Organised upon request from Ms. Rosina Stanislavova, mayor of Krasno Selo District, it laid foundations of future collaborations between CMDR COE and local authorities and the delivery of a simulation training related to the Crisis Response mechanisms. Such trainings are essential to the adequate preparation and training of the logistic and operational staff with regard to conducting a proper assessment of crisis situations and risks.

The seminar succeeded in enhancing the training audience's knowledge about the National Disaster Protection Plan and the National Unified Rescue System, which were presented by Commissioner Iliya Georgiev from the Fire Safety and Civil Protection General Directorate. Additionally, the seminar addressed

the administrative capacity for effective response to disasters and highlighted the importance of civil preparedness and disaster relief.

## The Chief of Defence of Turkiye visited CMDR COE



On 31 May 2022, General Yaşar Gıler, Commander of the Turkish Armed Forces, paid an official visit to CMDR COE. In his introductory remarks, the Centre's Director placed additional emphasis on the importance of collaboration and exchange of expertise in the CMDR domain. Furthermore, he highlighted the Centre's role in forging productive partnerships in support of NATO's transformation efforts in the aforementioned field.

## UK and US Embassies shared a visit to CMDR COE

On 9 June 2022, Major General Tony Wright, Deputy Chief of Staff for Strategic Plans and Policies (DCOS SPP) at NATO Headquarters, Supreme Allied Command Transformation (Norfolk, VA) and CMDR COE FOGO Champion, paid an official visit to the Crisis Management and Disaster Response Centre of Excellence. This special visit was closely related to the closing ceremony of the 10th Annual CMDR COE Conference and 2nd International Conference on Environmental Protection and Disaster Risks. In that regard, Major General Tony Wright highlighted the Centre's active contribution to topics, which are of significant importance to NATO.

#### The tenth Annual Conference of the Centre



The 10th Annual Conference on Crisis Management and Disaster Response and the 2nd International Conference on EnviroRISKs 2022 took place in hybrid mode from 6 to 9 June 2022 on the CMDR COE premises in Sofia. This key event was conducted in close cooperation with the Bulgarian Academy of Sciences (BAS).

The conference provided an excellent venue for interaction and exchange of information among the Centre's Community of Interest as well as between Subject Matter Experts from NATO, NATO Allies and Partners, the academia and participating organisations. Specialised panels were dedicated to different aspects of the overarching CMDR-related main theme of the event. The conference succeeded in raising awareness about the need for adequate

preparedness and in contributing to NATO's continuous transformation in the field of Crisis Management and Disaster Response.

## Focus on the Building Integrity



From 27 to 30 June 2022 the second iteration of the Building Integrity for Senior Leaders Course took place in CMDR COE in a hybrid mode. During the event a distinguished guest paid a visit to CMDR COE as a special guest speaker to the course - Dr. Rob Dixon, Her Majesty's Ambassador to Bulgaria, who pointed out how building integrity issues have turned out to be major challenges within the context of crisis management.

Corruption and poor governance are recognized as security challenges that undermine freedom, rule of law and economic development, and erode public trust. Therefore, the course was designed to assist and teach in building capacities and enhance institutions in the spirit of co-operative security.

The aim of the course was to raise awareness of corruption risks and to underline the best practices with regard to minimising and mitigating the impact of such risks on the security sector and public assets. Thus, the lectures, delivered by the BI UK Team from the Defence Academy of the United Kingdom, placed emphasis on integrity, accountability, counter-corruption and transparency.

## Hungarian flag-raising ceremony at CMDR COE



On 5 July 2022, a flag-raising ceremony marked the accession of Hungary to the Crisis Management and Disaster Response Centre of Excellence. Hungary officially joined the organisation on 1 July 2022, after signing a Note of Joining to participate in the Memorandum of Understanding of the establishment, administration and operation of the Centre.

The formal ceremony in front of CMDR COE's headquarters was attended by Mr Dragomir Zakov, Minister of Defence of the Republic of Bulgaria, and Lieutenant General Dimitar Iliev, Deputy Chief of Defence. ## In a NATO symposium



CMDR COE took part in the NATO Partnership 360 Symposium, which brought together civilian and military representatives from NATO Allies and Partner Nations with the aim to trace NATO's partnerships programmes. This year's symposium featured five in-depth breakout sessions, addressing Capacity Building, Innovation, Interoperability, Human Security, and the Rules-Based International Order. The event, co-organized by Allied Command Transformation and the International Staff Political Affairs and Security Policy Division, engaged the partnership network and community in Geneva, Switzerland from 11 to 13 July 2022.

#### An award from the Bulgarian Diplomatic Institute



On the occasion of the Bulgarian Diplomatic Service Day July 19, the Crisis Management and Disaster Response Centre of Excellence was awarded with an honorary prize. This is a sign of an honor for significant contribution to diplomacy and is presented by the Diplomatic Institute to the Ministry of Foreign Affairs of the Republic of Bulgaria. The CMDR COE has actively contributed to the Diplomatic Institute activities as the two institutions have more than once collaborated in the field of security and defense within the framework of NATO and the EU.

The Director of the Centre, Colonel Orlin Nikolov, accepted the award on behalf of the entire CMDR COE staff. In his gratitude speech, he pointed out that the collaboration between the CMDR COE and the Bulgarian Diplomatic Institute dates back to 2015, when the two institutions signed a contract for bilateral cooperation regarding the exchange of information as well as the organisation of conferences, scientific and

educational projects. In recent years, both institutions have been cooperating at a high level by exchanging lecturers and students, while also conducting joint courses with the European Security and Defence College (ESDC).

#### Disaster Relief in CSDP Context Course

The second edition of the Disaster Relief in CSDP Context Course took place from 19 to 22 July 2022 on the CMDR COE premises. This course focused on the impact of man-made, natural and climate driven disasters on the European Security (and in particular on the conduct of the Common Foreign and Security Policy (CFSP)/CSDP. The course participants from Bulgaria, Germany, Egypt, Great Britain, Jordan, Poland, Romania, Tunisia and USA broadened their knowledge of the EU institutional structures, mechanisms and instruments employed in disaster relief, the humanitarian activities. In particular, the synchronisation of diverse civilian and military CFSP/CSDP assets was highlighted with regard to disaster response. Additionally, the course addressed the partnerships and cooperation in terms of policies and practices between EU and other key stakeholders in the field, such as UN, NATO and leading humanitarian NGOs.

Mr. Joerg Einemann, Head of Integrated Border Management Unit, Law Enforcement Agencies Component, Operations Department, Coordinator of Border Support Activities project, shared the EUAM experience and action, and related challenges in the aftermath of the ongoing humanitarian crisis in Ukraine as the most relevant example of CSDP in action. Mr. Einemann presented the topics 'EU External Action in Practice - CSDP Instruments in Support of Disaster Relief' and 'EU Member States and EUAM Ukraine's Actions in the Aftermath of the Humanitarian Crisis in Ukraine'. Mr. Markijan Zelak from the Governance Component was among the participants in the audience. The course concluded with briefings on the Euro-Atlantic Centre for Resilience, located in Romania. The content of the presentations and the extremely relevant topics triggered thought-provoking and rewarding discussions between the participants and the experts.



#### The 2022 interns successfully complete their terms

On 29 July 2022 the CMDR COE Internship Research Paper presentations were delivered in front of expert audience from the Centre. Three interns were contributing to the COE's activities and everyday tasks related to crisis management and disaster response processes for more than five months as part of the first iteration of the 2022 Internship Programme. Ms. Siyana Pavlova worked on topic 'The Energy Transition In the Military', Ms. Nina Tatarska developed 'The Nato-Russia Relations In A Dynamic Security Environment' while Ms. Bozhidara Kiryakova presented her research on 'Communicating Strategically to Enhance Resilience Against Disinformation'. Certificates of appreciation were presented to the interns by the CMDR COE Director in recognition of their successful completion of the Internship Programme as well as in appreciation of their work on the research papers, and their dedicated work.



#### Hosting the 17th Conference on Computer Science And Intelligence Systems



The FedCSIS Conference provided a venue for presentations and discussions as well as opportunities for publishing of materials related to computer science and intelligence systems. From 4 to 7 September 2022, the forum gave the floor to researchers and practitioners from around the world to share their research results in their respective scientific and professional fields.


#### A course for planners development



The hybrid (residential and online) edition of the Crisis Response Operation Planners Professional Development Course was carried out from 12 to 16 September 2022. This year the CMDR COE accommodated course participants from Azerbaijan, Bosnia and Herzegovina, Georgia, Hungary, Italy, Netherlands, Poland, Romania, Tunisia and Bulgaria. The course provides the participants with basic knowledge of and raises awareness of the specifics of the operational planning process within the comprehensive approach used by NATO for collaborate with the International community. The course covered all aspects of the NATO Crisis Response Operational Planning Process, by presenting the NATO Crisis Response System and its elements, respective phases of the planning process and the cooperation between different stakeholders in this multi-dimensional environment.

The CRO Planners Professional Development Course is one of CMDR COE's specialised courses, strictly designed according to the NATO quality standards for E&T, and it aims to broaden the participants' knowledge of the crisis management process. In that regard, the focus is on the specific area of the crisis response operations planning at operational level, as laid down in the course curriculum.

## **Cultural Property Protection Course**



An online pilot course Cultural Property Protection and Crisis Management was held by the CMDR COE from 27 to 29 September 2022 in collaboration with The Medici Archive Project (Florence, Italy).

This educational event explored the main concepts and theoretical issues associated with CPP and the role of the military with regard to the increasing awareness within NATO and other international organizations of the importance of cultural heritage as one of the foundations of world civilization and the need to design new modes of CPP.

The course examined case studies of CPP (ancient Greece and Mesopotamia, Roman Empire etc.) from world history through the prism of modern leadership theories, as well as recent case studies in the context of post-conflict societies, especially Iraq, Ukraine, and Afghanistan. The course was attended by representatives of various civil and military organizations from 13 countries, including Bulgaria, Canada, the Czech Republic, France, Greece, Germany, India, Iraq, Italy, the Netherlands, Poland, the United Kingdom, and the United States of America. The course participants benefited from the expertise of

distinguished guest instructors from The Medici Archive Project, the Hellenic Multinational Peace Support Operations Training Center of the Hellenic National Defence General Staff (Greece), the U.S. Naval War College (USA), the Centro Superior de Estudios de la Defensa Nacional (Spain), the Consulate General of Greece in Erbil, the Ministry of Peshmerga (Iraq), the American University of Iraq, Sulaimani, the University of Basel (Switzerland), Jawaharlal Nehru University (India), and the Hellenic Organization for Cultural Resources Development (Greece). The trainees became acquainted with the cultural, historical, political, social, and religious factors that have shaped various approaches to CPP as well as the impact of military activities and operations. They garnered in-depth knowledge about the nexus of CPP and crisis management at the strategic and operational levels within the framework of a Comprehensive Approach to the preservation of cultural heritage, peace, and security.

#### Deputy Director Handover/Takeover Ceremony

engagement in Centre's everyday duties, great professionalism and enthusiasm.



#### CMDR COE'S OPERATIONAL LABORATORY

The CMDR COE works in different directions trying to find conceptual solutions, train and educate, test and validate the existing options. The primary goal is the development of innovations in the Crisis Management and Disaster Response domain. Presently, the most freed unit in the creative perspective in the Centre structure is the Operational laboratory (OpsLab). Still encouraged to be creative at their maximum, the other branches are naturally and core encoded limited by their duties and responsibilities in their creativity. The OpsLabis set as a cutting-edge science-technology body capable of dealing with many problems without strict regulatory limitations. There is a specific deviation between the NATO capabilities term definition and what is expected as products and processes from the OpsLab. This is due to the innovative and creative part of the OpsLab routine.

Primary aims of the OpsLab development arecapabilities to envision issues, analysing them, searching for effective and efficient resolutions to protect and secure alongside building resilience. Thusvery important is to predict eventual threats and innovative solutions. Such ambitions can be fulfilled by building capabilities in three directions - acquisition of the necessary hardware and software, precise selection of personnel and implementation of the products in the activities of the Centre.





#### Hardware and software capabilities

**Independent internal network.** A dedicated internet line was provided by the CIS to the unclassified OpsLab hall. Additionally, some network devices were used in order to configure the local laboratory network. Such an approach allows flexible switching of the network architecture and secure connectivity with external M&S partners.

**Network-attached storage (NAS).** It is a file-level computer data storage server connected to a computer network providing data access to a heterogeneous group of clients. The NAS is specialized for serving files either by its hardware, software, or configuration. Network-attached storage removes the responsibility of file serving from other servers on the network. It provides access to files using network file-sharing protocols such as NFS, SMB, or AFP. The device is at a high level of the small business class devices. It was installed in the unclassified OpsLab hall and connected to the dedicated internal network.

**Fire Wall.** It is a CISCO network security system that monitors and controls the incoming and outgoing network traffic based on predetermined security rules. The firewall establishes a barrier between a trusted internal network and an untrusted external network, such as the Internet. The procured device is with adequate parameters for the OpsLab needs and requirements. It facilitates a secure environment and at the same time the necessary external access points. It is also used as a router and switch for the lower network levels.

**Tree high-speed Wi-Fi routers.** The procured routers are with high bandwidth allowing the fast exchange of information. It is possible because of the new technology and the powerful processor embedded. Such parameters are required by federated modelling and simulation applications. The Wi-Fi technology allows usage in the mobile version of the OpsLab.

**Tree workstations and a server.** Four three machines are the backbone of the OpsLab. All software solutions are installed and configured to work properly in it. One of these workstations is equipped with two NVIDIA A100 Tensor Core GPUs that deliver unprecedented acceleration-at every scale-to power the world's highest-performing elastic data centres for AI, data analytics, and high-performance computing (HPC) applications.

From a software point of view, we found that there is no one solution to solve such kinds of complex tasks as they are in our domain. We choose a couple of products which are capable to cover our needs namely Virtual Battlespace, MASA SWORD, IBM IOC, PitchRTI Technology and CMDR COE Integrated development environment which is a product of the centre. All this specially developed and unique modelling architecture provides models of different disasters and events with an impact on human society forces and objects. It is made using mathematical models and the results are objective and realistic up to the accuracy and adequacy of the models and the input data. The output is dynamic, depending on the time, space and other conditions and has the all relevant and important parameters for the specific event (crisis or disaster). Visualize, analyze and assess the impact and influence of such events in a virtual environment - simulations. It allows for example to assess the dynamic impact of natural disasters over the planned military operation, its evolution and final results. It makes possible war gaming including crisis and disaster events, manual selection of the best course of action or automatic (brute-force computation) and supports significantly the decision-making process by providing dynamically generated response plans according to the specific conditions. This plan is based on the implemented rudimentary response measures, preliminary set target list, prediction of the event evolution, and the available forces and resources.

**Dedicated staff** - The dedicated staff is the personnel with three or more years span of duty. At the conceptual level, the staff requirements are for experts with specific abstract and creative thinking. The dedicated staff is supported by external scientists and experts collaborating on common projects. On the other hand, the training of the dedicated staff is the main tool to provoke their innovative thinking and expertise. Our training and education program is flexible and dynamic. For 2022 the personnel was involved in more than 10 specific courses in the area of Artificial intelligence, Different programming languages, Computer science etc.

**In support of CMDR COE's activities** - The operational laboratory is capable of supporting almost all processes of the centre and this has been proven over the years. For 2022, it supports 7 specialized courses, supports a number of exercises (SEVEN STARS, SEESIM, etc.) with the necessary expertise, and actively participates in NATO workshops with various assignments. (Distributed Synthetic Training, NMSG-187, exercise planning events, etc.). Conferences are an integral part of the laboratory and a field for acquiring up-to-date information.

Projects such as NMSG -187Space Weather Environmental Modelling (SWEM) are one of the key activities of the OpsLab. The Operations Laboratory, together with other members of the group, is working hard to create a space weather model with artificial intelligence-based prediction features.
